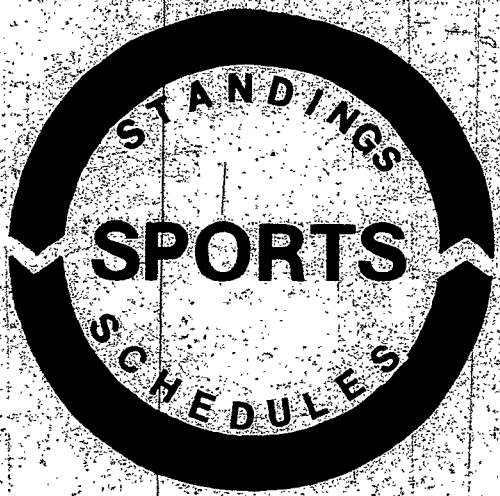

Pete Strohmeier's Bored But Not with Cycling

Pete Strohmeier says sociology is rather boring compared with bicycle racing or even speed skating, but don't tell his teacher at McQuaid!

Strohmeier, 17, and a senior, ranks among the top ten junior bicyclists in the U.S.; he recently finished second by the width of a bicycle tire at the Canandaigua Lake Cup Bicycle Race where he toured the 56-mile course in two hours, 11 minutes.

His second place finish was the best finish ever in the Canandaigua race by a Rochester racer.

Winner was Hugh Walton, 21, of Toronto, a member of the Canadian Olympic bicycle racing team.

Believe it or not, no less than 25 bicyclists bunched together at the finish and it took a strainer to determine that Walton won the event.

The final leg of the race was a half-mile straightaway distance, Strohmeier explains, sprinting all the way.

More than 125 bicyclists raced. Strohmeier rides a Legnano 10-speed bicycle made in Italy; he's been racing for only three years, but has quickly earned the respect of many veteran and more seasoned competitors.

He got into bicycle racing as a means to keep in shape for speed skating, but now he says speed skating has taken second fiddle to the bicycling.

"It keeps my legs going, it's fun, and most of the speed skaters race," Strohmeier explains.

Strohmeier and about 50 others make up the Genesee Valley Cycling Club, with a Rochester firm, Madac Corp., paying much of the sponsor's bills.

Strohmeier doesn't yet consider himself of Olympic calibre, but he is shooting for the U.S. Junior World Team.

Last year he missed a trip to Belgium by finishing sixth in competition where the first five made the junior team.

This year he expects to make the U.S. junior team because all of last year's team has moved up to the next level—the U.S. senior competition.

He won a big race in Washington, D.C. in April, at the National Ellipse Race, held on the ellipse in front of the White House.

He also recently completed a five day, 350 mile "tour" or series of races in Quebec where he took second place overall and won the point standings.

"It's like you get up at 9 o'clock in the morning after you eat, race to about 1 o'clock, eat, get rubbed down and go to sleep. It's like a different race every day for five days," Strohmeier explains.

The winner is the racer with the least amount of time over the total distance involved.

Madac and his dad co-finance the cost of the trips, according to Strohmeier.

There are no specific national rankings, but Strohmeier says right now he's in the top ten for juniors, 16-18; the senior division is for 18-and-over; the intermediate is for 13-15.

In speed skating Strohmeier is moving from the intermediates (16-18) to the seniors; he's a member of the Rochester Speed Skating Club and has won a number of major competitions including the Berkshire Hills (Mass.) Open last year.

He estimates he's in the top five among intermediate speed skaters in the east.

He says he prefers cycling but that's not the way it started out.

"There's a lot more money involved and you can make a career of bicycling where you can't in skating," Strohmeier says.

He intends to take a year off from school and train and compete in Europe next year.

A friend's mother has a house 20 miles north of Rome and he plans on racing out of there all summer.

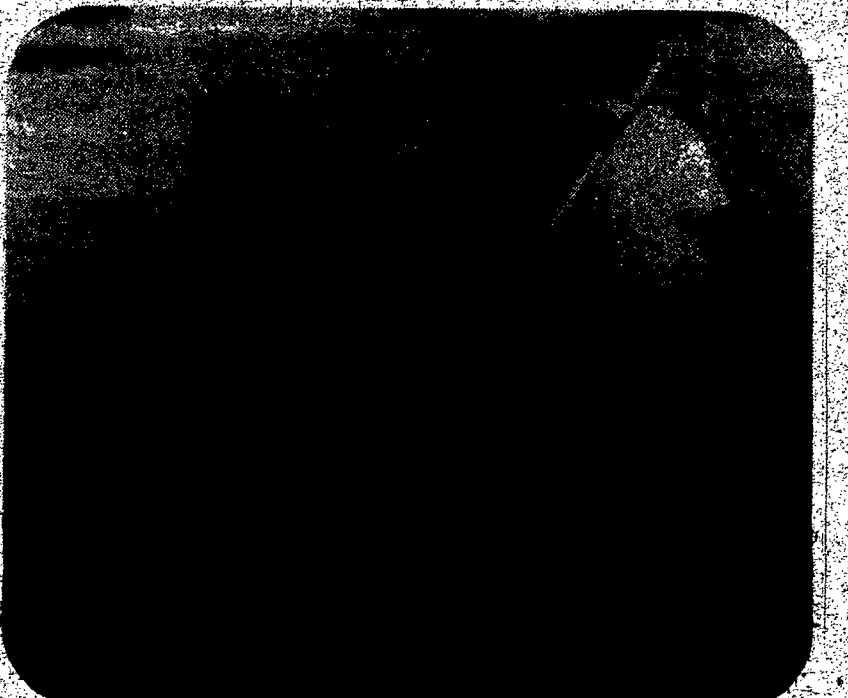
