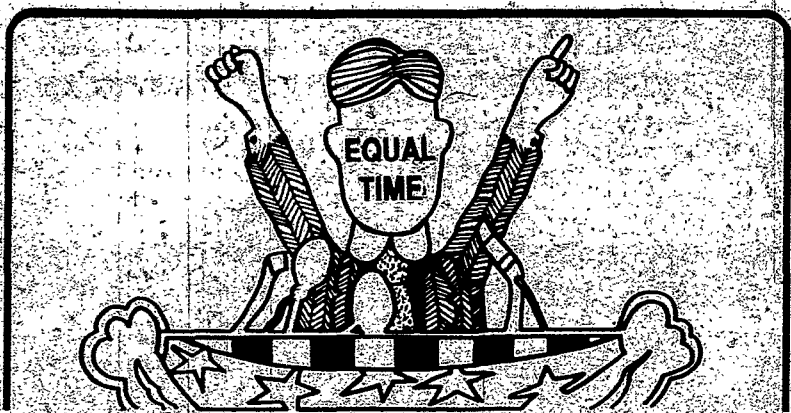


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What phase of school life most appeals to you?

Nazareth Opens Busy Year

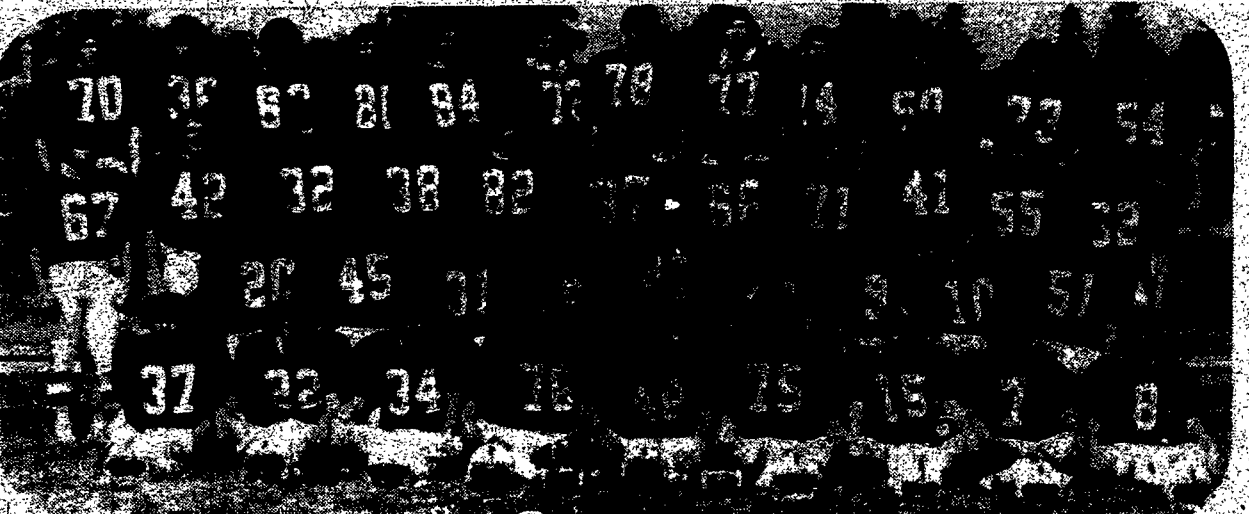
