Mercy Visitor to Speak On Women in the Church

Sister Elizabeth Carroll, RSM, staff associate of the Center of Concern in Washington, D.C., will speak on "Women in the Church" at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 25, in Mercy High auditorium, 1437 Blossom Road. The talk is open to the public.

Sister Elizabeth (formerly Sister M. Thomas Aquinas) is a past general director of the Pittsburgh Sisters of Mercy and a past president of both the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, and the Federation of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas.

She served as a delegate to the International Union of Superiors-General in 1967, 1970 and 1973 and a councilor for the same group from 1970-1973. She is a past professor, dean and president of Carlow College and was a lecturer at Catholic University of America from 1947-1951 and at Marquette University from 1959-1963.

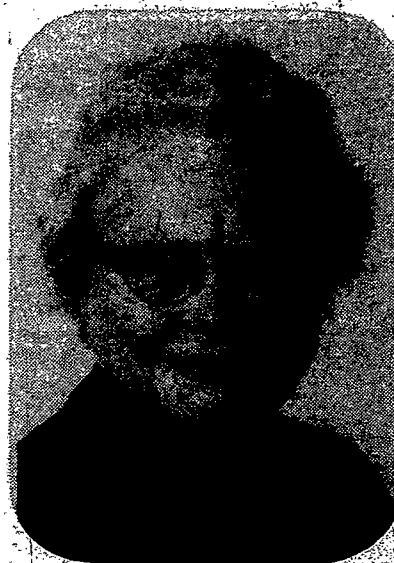
Her talk stems from her work at the Center of Concern where one of the projects last year was "Women in Church and Society: a Call to Justice."

Sister Elizabeth also will be the main speaker at the annual Mercy Day celebration Sept. 25. Her topic, "Mercy and Justice: Our Horizons," describes the focus of six workshops scheduled for the afternoon. A general session, a "prayerful reflection" on the heritage of the order's founder, Catherine McAuley, will be presented by Sisters Mary Florence and Jane Schur.

Now It's 'Bicentennial' Park

The new Brown Square Bicentennial Park near downtown Rochester was launched Saturday with an official groundbreaking ceremony.

Participating were city officials, Eastman Kodak representatives, leaders of the Brown Square Development Corp. (BSDC) and WEDGE, Inc., the neighborhood organization which first recommended reconstruction of the park.

BSDC is responsible for coordinating the design and construction of the park, which will be completed by next spring.

Kodak will contribute up to \$150,000 toward total cost of the project, as its "Bicentennial gift to the people of both Brown Square and Rochester." The City of Rochester will furnish about \$75,000 from federal funds.

receives under a Community Development Program and the BSDC is soliciting donated services and other contributions to meet the \$300,000 estimated cost of the park.

The park design was contributed by Rochester architect Jae Y. Ko, following a feasibility study by Gruen Associates of New York City. Nory Construction Company, of Rochester will be the general contractor responsible for phase one construction of the park. It will

feature picnic tables and benches; a fountain plaza; a sledding slope; bocci courts; pathways with benches; flower beds; an open meadow; and an historic plaque.

Once the recreational park is finished, BSDC will turn it back to the city for operation and maintenance. A sports playground which formerly occupied the site is being relocated to a site adjacent to School 5, one block north of the Bicentennial Park.
