Views From the Political Arena

As compared to a decade ago, the high school young adults of today are not only more politically aware but have the opportunity to see, at first hand, government in action.

Two such students were McQuaid sophomore Richard (R. B.) Quinn who as a press page attended both national conventions and Mercy senior Pilar Esperon who spent the summer in Washington, D.C. as a senatorial page.

R. B., basically a Ford man but who admitted "Carter is definitely ahead," is not a newcomer to convention life. He had attended the 1972 conventions and the mini-Democratic convention in Kansas City in 1974. As a press page, R. B. scurried around securing information and material for the reporters, ran errands for them, and kept the press machinery in working order.

Having been in Kansas before, it was New York City which held his fascinated interest although he was too busy to take in many of the sights. However, he and his colleagues did manage a quick trip to the Empire State Building.

In comparing conventions, R. B. preferred the Republican because there were more issues to be decided. He described the Democrat one as "no contest," with everyone headed in the same direction toward the same man, whereas in Kansas City, "There was more up in the air." At first, he even thought Ronald Reagan would win the nomination.

He acknowledged that control of the Republican event was difficult and at times turned into total chaos especially after the distribution of

musical horns. "From then on," he noted, "there was a constant hum of noise."

In surveying both events he pointed to the numerous, unnecessary speeches as an area where changes are needed. He recalled walking into the press room one day to find it piled high with copies of speeches yet on the agenda.

R. B. considered his convention experiences a great benefit to his political knowledge and when in 1980 he participates in his first national election there is no doubt he will be an informed and positive voter.

Pilar, in her capacity as a page for Republican Sen. Jacob Javits, was not only in the midst of the working government but saw such political celebrities as Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, Vice President Nelson Rockefeller, and Queen Elizabeth II.

The pages in their navy blue slacks, white blouses and black shoes (standard uniform) show up every morning 45 minutes before Congress convenes to do the general preparations for the day's session; distribute bills, amendments, calendars, agendas. Their duties included bringing the senators copies of bills and amendments; glasses of water; informing them of phone calls; delivering material to offices; and tracking down senators for an appearance on the floor for a roll call vote.

Asked what impressed her most, Pilar declared, "I couldn't believe the mass of papers going into the document room." She noted that at one time there were 200 printed amendments stacked on the senators' desks. She said she tried reading through some but couldn't understand them. "You have to be a

lawyer," she observed.

She took great interest in Parliamentary Procedure and learned how it controlled meetings and allowed those in the minority to be heard.

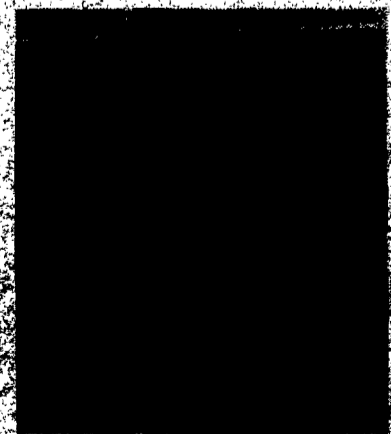
Hectic and unpredictable is the way she summed up the senators' workdays. In describing how chaotic things can become, she told how Sen. Charles Percy of Illinois, who was to be a guest at a party, attended a session in his tuxedo.

Pilar's stint in Congress has made her politically aware and informed about government representatives. "I know all the Republican senators," she claimed and laughingly added, "I knew Sen. Robert Dole before anyone else knew he existed."

Pilar, like R. B., is a Ford person, but as far as political parties go she considers herself an independent rather than a Republican.
