

President Ford sees the family the way most families do.

President Ford sees many issues from the viewpoint of how they will affect the American family.

The President sees court decisions handed down that undermine the authority of parents over their minor-aged children in matters like abortion and use of contraceptives, and he calls them a serious blow to the very fibre of the family unit.

The President sees educational *quality* being increased by more local control of local schools, but disrupted by federal interference, such as the forced busing of school children out of those schools.

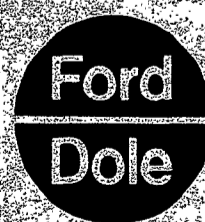
The President sees *diversity* as important in education, too, so he favors tax credit assistance to help those who send their children to private and parochial schools.

The President sees abortion as morally wrong, and favors an amendment allowing each state to pass its own law reflecting the sentiment of its own people.

The President sees the *stability* of society as a whole being enhanced by a firm approach to crime and welfare, which means tougher penalties for the criminal and useful work for the able-bodied welfare recipient.

The President sees peace—and the lives of thousands of young people—being maintained only if the military might of America is maintained, so he has fought those who would slash the nation's defense budget.

It's the way President Ford sees such issues as these that is convincing millions of Americans to see him as the man who should be their President for the next four years.
