

# Seton Sale To Benefit St. Mary's

A beehive of activity surrounds the many Seton women from 62 branches who are creating their handmade articles to be sold at the 20th annual Seton Sale. This sale will be held on Thursday, Oct. 21 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, Downtown.

Shoppers will find much to please their fancies. There will be handmade storybook dolls, decorative and patchwork pillows, macrame belts, metric cook books, patchwork quilts and many Christmas items will interest those who want to get a head start on Christmas shopping. While most articles will be handcrafted, there are other attractions at various booths. The Food Fair booth features jams and jellies, cakes and cookies. 
There will be professional babysitting.

These are only some of the highlights which place the Seton Sale out of the ordinary. The proceeds from this year's sale will purchase an ultrasound body scanner. Ultrasound is like sonar: signals sent out from and returned to the unit are displayed on a television type screen and dif-

ferentiate between liquid and solid substances.

The ultrasound system will be used in St. Mary's Radiology (X-ray) Department to determine whether unusual masses in the body are made up of liquid collections or solid tumors. Because ultrasound does not radiate the patient, it will also be used to determine the precise age of a fetus by measuring the fetal head, and to identify the presence of multiple fetuses or the need to use Caesarian Section due to poor fetal placement.


