Lebanon: A Place in History

It no longer takes decades for history to be evaluated. In today's fast-paced world, even while history happens it is discussed and explained by those who are directly involved.

Today's high school students benefit from this on-the-spot analysis through their various history courses. Because of the many nationalities represented in the St. Agnes High School student body, social studies teacher, Sister Marie Rene, has an unlimited source from which to draw international resources.

On Thursday, Oct. 7, her freshmen Afro-Asian class was treated to a special Middle East seminar given by Moustafa Nasser (grandnephew of the late Egyptian president, Gamal Nasser) and Jamal Deeb. Both young Moslems are from Lebanon; Moustafa from Baalbek, an ancient Roman town, and Deeb from Beirut, the country's capital.

The young adults, participants in the American Field Service foreign student exchange program, completed their senior high school year in Portland, Ore. They are now freshmen at St. John Fisher College,

taking Economics and English courses.

Lecturing on Middle East history and the present crisis is nothing new to either gentleman. While here in the U.S. they have given at least one and sometimes two and three presentations a week.

They view the present war in Lebanon as more political than religious and the result of conflicting intrigues between the U.S. and Soviet Union. Nasser explained the crux of the problem to be the "leftist groups" (Moslems) recognition of the Palestinian claim to remain in Lebanon; the rightist organizations (Christian) disallowance of this claim.

Nasser and Deeb stated they have received mail from home advising they not believe western newspaper reports on the war because things are not as desperate as reported. But there is difficulty in returning to their homeland because, according to the young men, the Beirut airport as well as certain sectors of Lebanon are closed because of the crisis.

Aside from explaining the Lebanese situation they enthusiastically described the Moslem culture. The

noted strong family ties as an inherent part of this culture. Their audience was surprised to learn that Moslem men don't marry until they are 30 or 35. Young girls, however, are married at the age of 15.

Nasser informed his listeners that Beirut is the hashish center of the world and though it is illegal for Lebanese to use the drug it is legal for it to be exported.

Both speakers agreed they find school easier here in the U.S. In Lebanon the school day is longer with no choice of subjects.

Nasser met his famous grand-uncle once while in Egypt for a track meet. He remembered him as a very big man "with eyes of magic." Though Moustafa has much respect for Egypt's President Anwar Sadat, his opinion is that Sadat doesn't have the magnetic personality of his uncle with which he commanded the Arab nations.

On return to Lebanon, Nasser will take physical education courses at a government school. Deeb, who wishes to be a doctor, will attend the American University in Beirut.

The St. Agnes students appreciated the insight into the areas they are studying. "We're finding out quite a few things," commented Susan Tette. "The Lebanon crisis makes more sense to me now."

Kathy Kaddis was impressed with "the way they described the way they live" and agreed with her classmates that this type of lecture "makes clear to me what we're studying."

DeSales Science Fair

Scholarships worth \$600 will be among the prizes at the first annual DeSales Science Fair. Exhibits will be displayed Saturday, Nov. 13 from 12-5 p.m. and Sunday, Nov. 14 from 1-5 p.m. in the DeSales gymnasium. The public is invited free.

Sixth, seventh, and eighth graders from Geneva and area schools are invited. The fair is open to students from both public and parochial schools. Any student or teacher wishing to take part should contact Sister Bernadine Freida at DeSales for further information.

Anne Smith, DeSales biology teacher, said the goal of the fair is

"to bring the area grammar school students and their parents to DeSales and show them that DeSales does have a good science program." Miss Smith added, "Catholic schools are believed by many to be inadequate in the sciences. We would like to dispel any fears that prospective students have on this subject."

Judging will be conducted by the science department. Exhibits will be judged on their originality and scientific content.

A \$400 scholarship to DeSales will be awarded the first prize winner, and a \$200 scholarship to the runner up.
