Wanting a challenge, Nazareth student Donna Damelio took up dancing and has not only met the challenge of ballet, modern dance and tap but also has been successful in winning many competitions both solo and with the group "Energy."

"Energy" Is Her Middle Name!

To Donna Damelio, dancing does not just consist of the "Hustle," "Bus Stop," and the "Bump." Donna, a senior at Nazareth Academy, has been taking dancing lessons for five years and those years have paid off well.

Five years ago, Donna wanted to get involved in something that would be challenging as well as enjoyable. Her mother suggested gymnastics or dancing, and Donna chose dancing. She enrolled in the Diane Lee Dance Center and at first started with ballet and jazz but progressed into tap and modern dancing. Donna has, for the last two years, been a dance instructor at the Dance Center. This, she stresses, "is really great. Teaching gives her the ability to learn how to deal with all kinds of people, and also reinforces her own style and technique. Teaching, according to Donna, helps her to improve.

Donna considers dancing a fantastic experience. She spends an average of 16 hours per week practicing. And though it is hard work, she loves it. There is nothing she'd rather do, and it is something she could never give up.

Donna has won many competitions, both solo and with her company, "Energy," which consists of four very energetic girls - Donna, Dawn Coccia, also from Nazareth, Linda Cerrone (Cardinal Mooney)

and Rene Fasciano (Greece Athena). In the Summer Dance Festival competition, held at Churchville-Chili High School, Donna had the highest solo score (387 out of 400) for the two-day competition. She performed a jazz dance. In the competition, "Energy" took top prize in all four of the group dancing categories.

From there, Donna and "Energy" went on to the State Competition where the group received the Super-Grand Championship for their dance, Modern American Trilogy. Donna also won first runner-up for a solo tap dance she performed. Because Energy won the state competition, they were personally requested by the director of the Summer Dance Festival to perform in Syracuse at the State Fair.

On the first day of competition, they competed against eight other people, came in first, and won \$300. Then, the next day, they went on to the talent competition. This was not only against other excellent dancers, but also bands, music majors, and even semi-professional entertainers. Here they found the competition very stiff. However, despite the difficulty of their category, they came in first place. For winning this, the director of the Syracuse State Fair Talent Show Committee asked Energy to return in 1977 and perform daily for the entire State Fair.

All of Donna's dances are self-choreographed. She considers the best parts of the whole year the competitions and recitals. During competition, Donna has the opportunity to meet many new people, from all over the country and Canada. She gets to know them personally, and makes lasting friends. She also enjoys discussing different styles and modes of dancing with them.

Another opportunity Donna takes advantage of is going to the dance conventions held here and around New York State. At conventions, dancers from all over the state get together, a guest teacher comes in, from Syracuse, Buffalo or New York City, and the dancers learn and develop technique and style.

Donna is considering a dance career. She is seriously thinking about going to New York City next year and joining one of the companies there. Though she enjoys teaching, she is more interested in performing. When asked if she had any suggestions to give anyone interested in dancing, Donna was adamant in her opinions. "If you ever have any feelings at all about dancing, do it," she stressed. "Go to an established school. One needs a school that has high standards. This develops self-discipline in yourself and enables you to go a long way. It's very enjoyable, a great experience, and also fantastic physical exercise."
