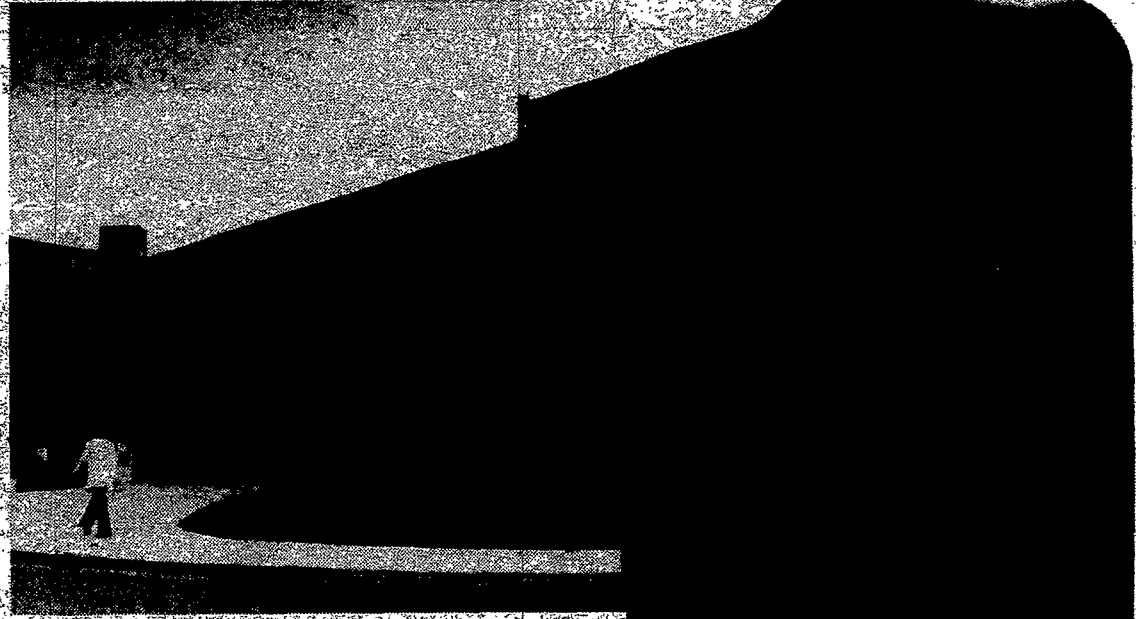


Shults Community Center Dedicated

Clothing Drive Alert Sounded

Monroe County parishes were alerted this week to a Nov. 15 deadline for ordering the boxes they will need during the annual Thanksgiving Clothing Drive.

Father William J. Flynn, chancellor, who coordinates the drive in Monroe, advised the parishes by letter to call his office as soon as they could estimate their needs. The cartons are donated by the St. Joe Paper Company. Pickup schedules are worked out by the East End Carting Company.

Collection dates will vary in the parishes, but the week of Nov. 21-27 is the period designated by the U.S. Bishops.

Father Robert Beligotti is handling arrangements for the Auburn area. Father Jeremiah Moynihan is Corning-Elmira coordinator.

Catholic Relief Services puts the emphasis this year on blankets, light weight clothing and yard goods, noting also a need for men's work clothes and infants' layettes.

And they're still climbing. A pole that cost \$43 in 1970 is now up to \$107. During the same period, the trucks that carry them have increased in price by 110%. The wire we string on the poles has gone up 104%. Coal used to produce electricity has gone up more than 200%. And transformers that adjust the voltage that comes into your home have gone up from \$238 to \$390. Altogether, RG&E spent \$308,070,000 for equipment, fuel, taxes and other operating costs in 1975—compared with \$165,577,000 six years ago. And we're facing an even greater inflationary squeeze in our building program. Since 1970, when we completed our Ginna nuclear power station, the cost to build an identical plant has increased more than 500%. We at RG&E don't like to send higher utility bills any more than you like to receive them. But the high cost of everything used to serve you has hit us hard.
