lust as a doctor determines our physical state by listening to our symptoms, I would think a confessor could learn something of the spiritual health of the penitent by listening to the sins that trouble the soul. How would a patient feel toward a doctor who said that he was not interested in hearing a "laundry list" of symptoms. I am sure the doctor does hear the same old complaints over and over from his patients; but he considers the individual patient and does not lightly dismiss a list of frequently heard complaints. There is really not too much new under the sun that an experienced listener has not heard about human weaknesses.

I wonder if the clergy under-estimate the depths of religious feeling and sincerity that their people have. Too, I wonder if they underestimate their people's ability to discern and make their own judgments with a little spiritual direction. People have always tried to follow the spirit of the law and fo make spiritual adjustments to meet their own particular need or problem. Everything does not have to be spelled out to them in minute

The sensitivity and insight of your first paragraph leads me to believe that priests as counselors and confessors would do well to listen more closely to people like you. But it is this particular kind of understanding and help in the confessional that we would like to bring about through revisions in the The funeral of Franklin G. Wa New Rite.

Regarding your second paragraph, I think you misunderstand the use of the expression flaundry list." We have no objection whatsoever to listening to sins that trouble the soul and we would like people to present them in the confessional not only from the point of view of celebrating their rejection of them but from the point of view of perhaps gelting some needed counsel. We refer to a laundry list only when it is a barren recitation of sins which are usually repeated every time the person comes to the confessional — "I was angry five times, I swore ten times, I missed my morning prayers five times. It is this kind of thing which bears little or no relation to the real state of the person's soul and therefore is quite meaningless in terms of any change in that person. We would like to have people understand perhaps a little better why they are angry, why they miss their prayers, why they swear. It is when we really want to do something about a problem that we ask why we do it and what means are required to stop doing it.

I suppose it is quite possible that we of the clergy do underestimate people's religious feeling but I don't think that we underestimate the sincerity of so many people with whom we come in contact, who are indeed a great inspiration and joy. However I do think your last sentence is a little too simplistic and while it refers to a substantial number of people, there are many others who do not have that insight and that spiritual development of which you speak


