The Practical Side of Learning

Today's educational methods, instead of confining students to classrooms, give them the opportunity to observe their book learning transformed into action.

Such is the aim of Patricia Monopoli's St. Agnes sophomore Home Skills B-Class. This class is a full-year course and it covers such practical necessities as nutrition, clothing, child development, personal grooming and development as well as in-depth looks into the various career fields. It was the latter three areas which prompted the group's visit to The Continental School of Beauty on Oct. 13.

A cosmetology school, Continental opens its facilities to area high schools to give young adults the opportunity to check out the professional training and requirements for a career in hairdressing.

The St. Agnes student tour consisted of on-the-spot explanations of the school's curriculum and the training techniques needed for a New York State Hairdresser's license. The girls also viewed classroom procedures and clinic operations. They observed through first-hand experience, the skilled methods involved in the profession as they happily submitted to glamorous ministrations — eyebrow arches, manicures, and haircuts.

Colleen McCarthy discovered the patron-operator rapport when she nervously wondered about her decision to have her hair cut. She

was assured it would be done according to her wishes and she would enjoy her new image.

In Nancy Dolan's case, the field trip was just the thing for her career interest. "I've always liked cutting my own hair," she said, and this led to her desire to find out more about the profession.

She also agreed with her classmates that a course such as Home Skills is a must for all students. "It helps you when you move out of the house to go out on

your own and also when you get married."

Mrs. Monopoli plans an active year for her students. Other field trips will be to the various Board of Cooperative Educational Services facilities to observe a full range of special educational classes; nutrition, food services, child-care and development. She expects these learning trips to broaden her students' horizons in home economics and to give them a greater base on which to plan future careers.

Things Hopping At Nazareth

Nazareth Academy's Student Council is busy planning several important activities for the school year. To unify the student leadership of the school, the Council formed a new committee, Leadership '76, which brings together class officers, National Honor Society officers and Student Council representatives. This committee is sponsoring a monthly Mass to provide an additional opportunity for worship within the school community.

Other activities planned are the annual Christmas Formal in December and a talent show in January. Leadership '76 is considering sponsoring an ethnic assembly in Spring to celebrate the rich diversity of cultures, customs, and arts that is represented at Nazareth. Also new this year is a "peer counseling" program in which students counsel their peers on minor problems. Throughout the

year the Student Council operates a snack bar which makes coffee, juice and donuts available before school.

A careers week early in the second semester and a father-daughter dinner dance are other projects. Leadership '76 will be discussing in the weeks ahead.
