


Nazareth President Installed

many people in the world anyway. to feed all of them and it's wrong to. have more It's wrong to force people to have babies; that's compulsory pregnancy. I knew that my dad and mother wouldn't even have to know because that's the law. And most people favor abortion anyway.

Well, I would never let this happen again. I. will volunteer for childrens, things and work to really help humanity like the people in prison or migration camps. Nobody cares for them, I wasn't wrong. Sex doesn't have to wait till marriage, it all depends. I know a priest who said that I'm sexually active by nature. Planned Parenthood showed us all that stuff like books and things, written by doctors. And their clinic really helped. They had girls down there like me who really understood and really helped. Parents don't understand that things have changed and aren't like they used to be Religions are all the same now, we should be allowed to choose the one we want: I'm mature now and it doesn't bother me to talk about it (the aboution) Lots of Catholics favor it. In fact it was Catholics who referred me to the clinic."

"Oh God, oh God! I felt I couldn't take nine months. Everyone would know, my cousins and all. My grandfather: Oh God, oh God! It was awful. I wondered if the heart was beating or the brain functioned before I even knew he was there, and whether it was a little boy or girl and cried. It was awful, I knew I couldn't keep a baby, I wasn't old enough. But I couldn't kill him, I remembered the film Sister showed about the fer-tilization and development and unforgiving how they grow and everything. My mother took me to an older priest. I couldn't take nine months! Who would help? It wasn't a real baby then anyway just a few cells. I knew I wouldn't love the right decision. I knew my mother really loved me. It was a little boy. Thank God for Sister

deformed? Or handicapped and retarded? Or handicapped and little boy. Thank God for Sister something? It's not right to have them like that And it was only there to make me suffer anyway. That's the way everything's been my whole life.

"I couldn't stand nine months and I didn't want a baby anyway. And children should be wanted the law said that I could have an abortion if it threatened my life or health, and I might have had a nervous breakdown or committed.


