AS I SEE IT

By the time this is in print, the presidential election will be over and thus the matter of the debates past discussion.

Still after watching all four I find them a subject worth mentioning, if only briefly.

Leaving the question of how important it is that a president be able to think quickly on his feet to the experts I will address myself to another aspect and that is the opportunity such a forum gave to the American people to take a closer look at both candidates.

If there is one thing the glare of a TV camera can do better than anything else it is to expose the phony, the contrived, weakness of character.

The viewer does not even need to pay a great deal of attention to the questioning and the verbal answers. Watch instead the movement of eyelash or brow, the set of the mouth, the stance, the manner in which he answers the question rather than the content. All will tell

you something of how the debater views himself, self-respect, inner peace, confidence in his own ability.

For viewers like myself, not familiar with statistics and other technical data to analyze the answers from that standpoint, the personal quotient is a reasonable substitute for arriving at the merit of the man. Such criteria, seemingly superficial, may be more reliable than one would think. If a viewer can, after watching a candidate perform under fine scrutiny for 90 minutes, say to himself, "I can place my trust in this man" or "I cannot," then it would seem that one's voter instinct should be trusted.

Two female advertising executives have reported that women respond more positively to commercials which view them in "traditional roles" than to other types of product publicity.

Employees of Cadwell Compton Advertising and Ted Bates and Co. revealed their finds at a meeting convened by the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility, a unit of the National Council of Churches.

The response here is "Bunk!" If by traditional roles the ad people mean to picture women on their knees moaning about their wax

buildup or spoon-feeding cough syrup to a mewling spouse, forget it. It has always been one of the chief failures of both the ad people and the TV people who have been joined seemingly forever in unholy wedlock to underestimate the intelligence of the American viewer.

Someday, hopefully soon, the ad industry and TV behemoths will both discover that Mary Hartman is a figment of a man's imagination and a stupid man at that, not the archetype of the female population.
