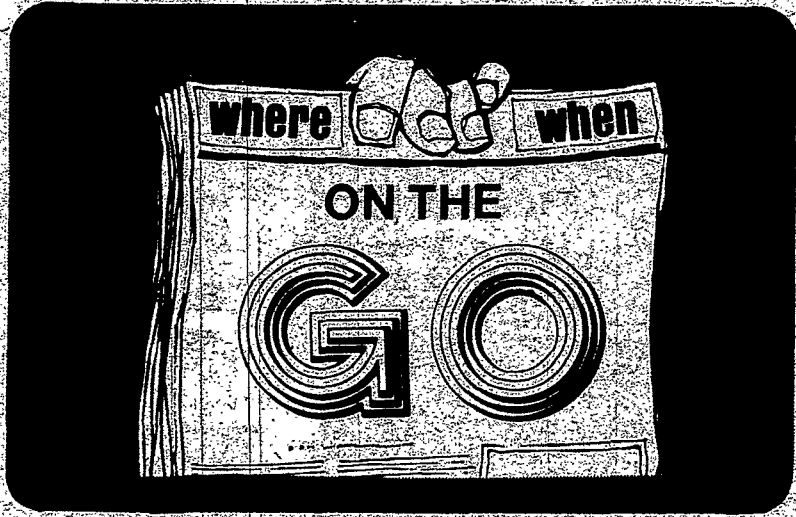

Nazareth Wins Literary Awards

Nazareth Academy students and faculty advisors returned from Empire State School Press Association Convention held in Syracuse Oct. 22, well-rewarded for their efforts on the staffs of Nazareth's publications.

Schools all around New York State entered their best and most recent publications for evaluation in this annual competition sponsored by Syracuse University's S.S. Newhouse School of Communications.

Nazareth's literary magazine, "Spectrum," won the highest honor possible. Spectrum was awarded 915 of a possible 1000 points. The judges commended the Spectrum staff for "an excellent publication — one which shows what a staff can accomplish when it works together to produce a literary effort." In their critical review, the judges commented on the attractive design, selection of material, high calibre of content and effective use of artwork and photography.

Nazareth's newspaper, "The Gabriel," and yearbook, "Lantern," each merited first place ratings.

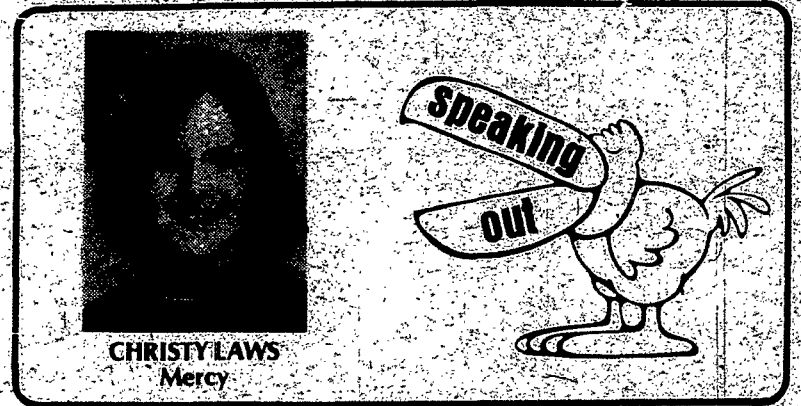

THOMAS MERTON SOCIETY

The Thomas Merton Society, now being formed at Nazareth College to stimulate continued interest in the prolific writer's works, will hold its first organizational meeting tomorrow night at 7:30 in the Forum of the Otto A. Shults Community Center. The meeting is open to the public.

Monsignor William Shannon, chairman of the college's department of religious studies, will explore the contemporary significance of Merton's philosophies under the title, "Word of Silence."

Merton was a Trappist monk from 1941 until his death in 1968. His works include *The Seven Storey Mountain*, *New Seeds of Contemplation*, *Bread in the Wilderness* and *Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander*.

Did you ever think you could sell stock, raise capital, and start up a business as a teenager? Well, that's what Junior Achievement is all about.

As a former achiever of two years I learned a great deal which was helpful in that it gave me better insights into the future and what I might like to do after high school.

JA gives teenagers in high school the great opportunity actually to be part of the business world by working in it. It gives them a chance to learn what business is really like and it provides them with a basic knowledge which will be beneficial to them later on in their careers.

Each JA company contains 20-30 members and a selected staff of advisors from area corporations. These advisors help in starting the company by giving it any guidance it needs. Each company also has a president, secretary, treasurer, vice president of manufacturing, vice president of sales, and a quality control manager.

In order to manufacture a successful product, the company must first of all raise capital through the sale of stock at \$1 a share. After a product has been selected by majority vote a production line is set up and the manufacturing process begins. After being thoroughly inspected, a fixed price is set and the product is ready to be marketed. Each member of the company receives a salary and commission for whatever he or she can sell. It is then the Vice president of Manufacturing's job to take inventory after every meeting.

and the Vice president of Sales makes an accounting of what has been taken out and sold.

During the middle of the year, the annual Junior Achievement Trade Fair is set up where all the companies from one general area (such as Rochester) gather together to sell their products. Last year, Rochester's JA Trade Fair was held for one week at Midtown Plaza.

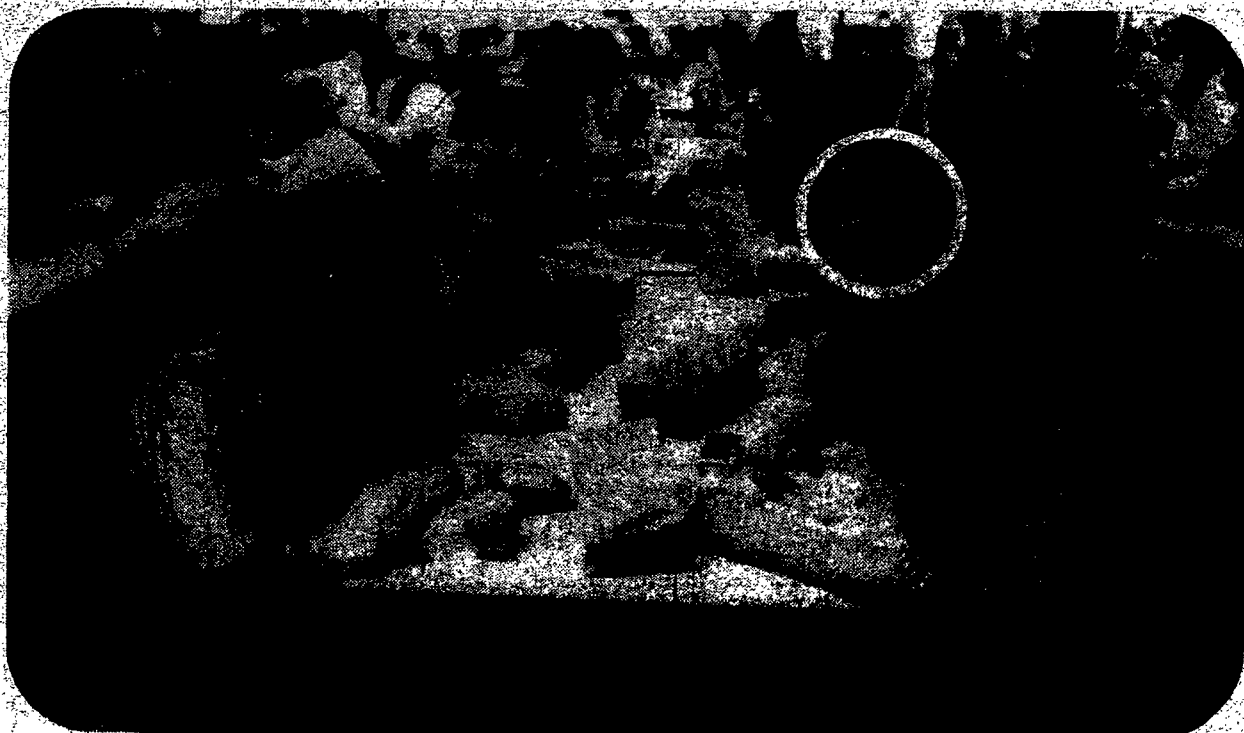
At the end of the JA year each company is liquidated and an annual report of the year's activities is sent to all stockholders. This report also includes a letter from each officer summarizing the performance of his or her duties.

Finally, the annual Junior Achievement Barquet winds up the year. Here, awards are given to certain officers for their leadership and working ability. An award also is given to the best overall company.

Junior Achievement is a good business to get into. Why not try it? What can you lose?
