"We were 8-1 overall and beat our crosstown rival Geneva High, 14-6, in our only non-league game,"

DeSales finished second in the Wayne-Finger Lakes circuit's western division nand earneds honorable mention in the state small schools' ratings for the third year in a row.

The team's success this season, with 15 seniors on the roster, may not be repeated next year. The

DeSales JVs, for example, only Chris Lavin is a senior at Geneva finished one game above 500.

DeSales dressed some 35 players at the varsity level, a luxury considering past years. Six players made All-Conference.

Doug Graham was the starting quarterback; he threw 13 touch-down passes during the season, averaging 91 yards per game in the

A senior, Craham was a second team All-Conference selection which disappointed many: First team choice was Dundee's Jason Ballard.

Tom Bucklin was the flatback and scored 70 points, He also was a three-time pick for All-Conference honors at running back, defensive back and kicker.

A senior, Bucklin booted 22 extra points and got the rest on TDs. He was third in W-FL scoring.

Doug Smaldone, another senior, played halfback and led the Saints in single game rushing with a high of 140 yards.

Senior Louie Ventura started the season at fullback, but was injured in the fourth game. Junior Mike Riley took over, averaged 60 yards rushing per game, and scored eight

Ventura hadn't logged too many. running yards, but was able to provide the Saints with that one big, key run from time to time.

Jim Maher saw a lot of action at running back until the fourth game when the suffered a ruptured kidney. Maher is a senior.

Senior Bill Tapscott made of fensive and defensive All-Conference end, he missed the last three games of the season because of an injured arm.

He finished with four TD pass receptions and over 300 yards gained in passes despite missing the

Tim Tapscott, Bill's brother, a junior, caught five TD passes at the other end and made 2nd team All-Conference.

John Siroka, a junior, played tackle and was one of DeSales best blocking linemen each Monday morning on the game films, Lavin explains.—

Dan Linehan, another senior, played the other tackle and made All-County both ways:

Junior Dave Eddy held down the center spot and was also an All-County choice for the offensive

Steve Valentino, - Tim-Baumgartner, Pete Quigley and Bob Grim rotated at the remaining guard positions.

Sam Cristanti, an All-Conference defensive linebacker, also played a few periods on the offensive line

Bucklin played defensive safety, John Quethara and Smaldone were the defensive corner backs, and Ventura, Baumgartner, Bob Jaynes and Joe Kenney were the defensive linebackers.

Ventura made All-Conference as a defensive linebacker.

Desales held opponents to less than 300 yards rushing per games while averaging 223 yards on the ground and 91 in the air.

The Saints outscored the opposition by 228 to 54 for the year.

Last year the Saints also lost only one game and finished second; two seasons ago they shared the division title with Lyons and

A Look at Human Needs

Elmira - Notre Dame students took time from their classes: Monday, Nov. 8, to discuss the problems of those less fortunate than they. Father Neil Miller, Office of Human Development Appalachian Tier staff, keynoted the day's activities, followed by several seminars on specific topics which the students selected.

"A rich community isn't one that has a lot of money," Father Miller told the students "A rich community is where you have people who care about each other and share what they have." He also noted that there are 26 million poor people in the United States, at a time when some feel that "there's already too much being done for the poor." Father Miller suggested that the problem "may be that we're doing the wrong things for the poor."

The seminars covered such topics as prison ministry, pro-life, the elderly, Appalachian poverty, and a program which involves high school students "adopting" younger student.
