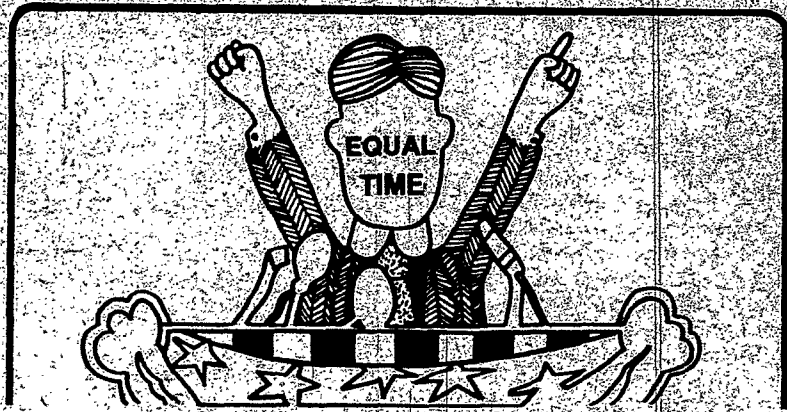

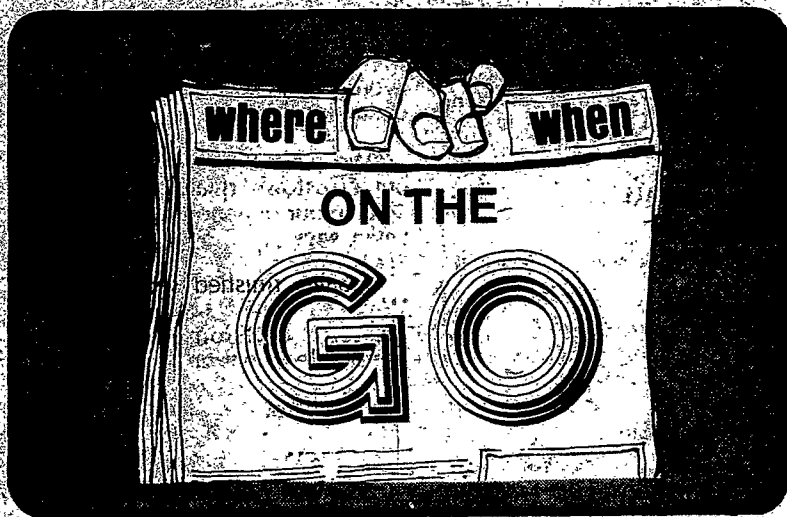
Anne Quigley, junior, school play
