Jimmy/ Nealon, tennis ace :Bill Nealon's younger brother, says he's still a student at East Irondequoit's Norwood Middle School, but one senses he's gaining.

An eighth grader, Jimmy thinks he wants to go to Eastridge High, unlike Bill and another brother lohn, a 14-year-old freshman at Bishop-Kearney High:

Bill, of course, overran his City-Catholic and Section 5 tennis opponents without much difficulty and began to look for greener pastures.

He believes he found those pastures in Chattanooga, Tenn-where he enrolled in September as a junior at The McCallie School, a prep school.

Last weekend Bill defeated second-seeded Paul Crozier of Corpus Christi, Tex., 6-4, 6-7, 6-3, to win the U.S. Tennis Association Boys 16-and-under National Indoor Championship.

He competed in a field of 128 of the country's best age group tennis players; and with a booming serve. operating at full blast, fired 19 aces in his semifinal victory and another 10 against Crozier in the title

At 16, Bill is the oldest of the famous Nealon tennis family which has won many Rochester tennis titles over the years.

Jimmy says Bill calls his parents (Bill and Ann Nealon) once a week and writes when he finds the time.

"He's awfully busy down there," limmy says. "It's supposed to be a pretty good school for academics. And it's very good in sports."

The weather is nice, in fact excellent for tennis, in the 75s, says Jimmy, who has not been down

"My mother has been there" he adds, "because Bill won't be back until Christmas."

Bill left Rochester to find his place in the tennis sun; a friend recommended McCallie as a good place to start frontcally the friend, Tim Wilkison, skipped his winter term at the school to compete as an amateur on a pro tour in Austraila.

We feel this is the best thing for Bill. He's playing tennis every day and he's playing outdoors," Jimmy

Jimmy didn't win any tennis titles himself this summer, but he says he fared well in a doubles tournament in Syracuse where he and George Gould of Fairport gained the semifinals:

While he's not certain Bill can

make it in pro tennis, he has no illusions about himself.

"I don't have a shot at it at all; I'm way out of it," Jimmy concedes

I should have started working at it a few years ago. While Jimmy is only 13 and began playing at age 8, he says he only began to play competitively two or three years ago when he was 10.


A man is incarcerated because he refuses to kill another human being in a war that he considers morally wrong, while a president who was caught misusing the trust of the people, resigns in the tace of the


