

Sunday's Readings: (R3) Lk, 1:39-45 (R1) Mi. 5:44 (R2) Heb. 10:5-

The prophet Micah was a peasant; his contemporary, the great Isaiah, was an aristocrat. Thus, Isaiah centered his prophecies on royal Jerusalem, whereas Micah concentrated his on the country village of Bethlehem, of the district of Ephrathah Bethlehem had figured as David's birthplace but was too insignificant to play any further part in the history of royalty. First Hebron and then Jerusalem had been chosen as the seat of David's government. But Bethlehem, wrote Micah, would one day be glorified by the birth of the Messiah whose origin is from of old". (eternity). When Magi sought the King of the Jews, scribes guoted Micah's prophecy to them. "From you (Bethlehem) shall come forth one who is to be ruler in Israel" (R1).

The second reading looks back into the ancient origins of this ruler. It reveals Jesus obedience as reaching back to eternity in the bosom of the Trinity; Jesus said, "have come to do your will, O God' (R2). His Father's will was that the Son accept the human condition, which includes death. The will of the Father willed by the Son is His will (or testament) to us, which is to accept God's will no matter the

Because it was God's plan to raise up a Savior, not from royal Zion, but from lowly Bethlehem, He left Israel at the mercy of her enemies — "therefore the Lord will give them up" give them up" — but only for a while "until the time when **she** who is to give birth has borne.

Through the centuries which the vision of prophets pierces only persons gigantically great can be distinguished. One such person however indistinctly perceived always looms large throughout the great prophecies of Redemption — a woman. In the first gospe! "I'll put enmities between thee and the woman" (Gen 3:15); in Isaiah "a young woman shall bear and conceive a son" (ls. 7:14); and she is also mentioned by Micah (R1); In other words, salvation was to come through one who always associated

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with himself a woman. How in keeping with the fundamental lines of revelation is the honor the Church pays to Mary!

In the gospel we see that that woman is Mary. She bears the Savior in her womb when she visits her cousin Elizabeth and so is the true Ark of the Covenant.

The visitation story is reminiscent of the transfer of the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem (2) Sm. 6:2-(1). This was done amidst joy, song and dance. The Ark was first brought to the house of Obededom where it stayed for three months. blessings. When Mary, the true Ark, visited Elizabeth, there too was joy: "the baby leapt in my womb for joy." Mary stayed at the house of Zechariah for three months and she brought untold blessings to that

The Ark of the Covenant was not only the symbol of Cod's presence. among His people; it was also their palladium in battle. The Ark connoted warfare. When Elizabeth greeted Mary, her words augured victory in battle, for she used the selfsame words with which victorious women in the Old Testament had been greeted. It was Deborah, in her victory song, who first greeted Jael, the slaver of Barak, with "Blessed art thou among women" (Jg. 5.24); and Uzziah repeated the same greeting to Judith who had slain the invader of Israel, proud Holofernes (Jdt. 13:18). Thus Mary, the true dwelling place of God among men, was seen, by Elizabeth and St. Luke and the early Church as the woman who assures final victory over evil. and inaugurates an era in which sin and unhappiness, the serpent's head, are crushed and conquered.

Mary is the dwelling place of God among men, the true Ark of the Covenant. No more does God dwell in temples made by men's. rands, but in living persons. After the example of Mary every Christian is meant to be a sign of God's presence in the world, a monstrance, radiating Christ — Cod again and again being brought to men through men
