TV Guide's Judith Crist calls: the play, which incidentally is the first in a series titled "A Tribute to American Theatre," a ["brilliant adaptation." 🛴

As a viewer who agreed with neither extremist, I was reminded all over again how subjective any critique must be by virtue of its origin and secondly that every viewer is a critic who should not let himself or herself be swayed by the professional observer who gets paid: for stating his or her opinion.

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
Obviously reviewers such as O'Connor and Crist have an advantage over most of us in that they have seen a great deal more theater and thus on the basis of comparison are more likely to give an experienced judgment as to the relative merits of a work. On the other hand when two such discerning professionals disagree so violently it must give any viewer looking for guidance pause, all of which leads to the question. How does one or about judging whether does one go about judging whether a work of art (any work of art) is good, bad, great or indifferent?

nAfterlo reading the widely disparate analyses of Cat" I mentally pulled out my own list and looked at the factors which help decide whether or not a work has value for me:

-First and foremost for this viewer is the application of the question. Does the play (or book or whatever) have the power to make me forget everything but what is happening on stage? Am I oblivious to my surroundings, forgetful that the actors are actors, so caught up in the action and dialogue that I am literally spellbound? If the answers to all those are yes then it's almost certain that I am beholding a masterpiece....

Second: The use of comparison, How does this stack up against other similar efforts I have seen.

Third Am I learning something? Has the author or artist changed me unrevealed truth about the nature

Fourth: Am I more conscious of the style than I am of the content? Is the tail wagging the dog?

Fifth: Am I sorry to see the play end? Or am I relieved? Or indifferent?

Sixth: Will it stand the test of repetition and of time? Can I sit through this a second time and a third and a fourth and still find it. fresh and diverting Will I be able to look at this in 10 years time and still find it thoughtful and exciting?

Most critics probably use similar criteria or variations of them and still can reach such polarized views of the same work as exemplified by Crist and O'Connor

Obviously then there is no one - Miss Mary lo Mulligan is musical phr opinion and each, of us is director and Mrs. Helen Rupert the choreographer.

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
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


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
