Another "first" for the first recruit was his assignment in 1942 to the War College in Washington as its first chaplain. In October 1945, two months after the end of World War II, he was assigned to the Veterans Hospital in Canandaigua, the first Catholic priest appointed to the then new Veterans Administration Chaplaincy Corps In his initial assignment; with the First Division, he was at Fort Ethan Allen in Vermont and Fort Devens, Mass.

Father Hanna attended the diocesan seminaries and was ordained in 1936. He served as assistant pastor of Holy Gross, Rochester, and St. Aloystus, Auburn, before joining the Army

When he came back, he lived at the family home in Wellington Avenue, taking care of his ailing father, the late Frank Hanna during the first six years of his Villa job. "So I've lived out here for 24 years, volved in Refugee and Reset-

The home of his own is in the Villa neighborhood."'After all this time," he said, "I couldn't leave


Help Offered for Families With Iron Curtain Relatives

The Immigration and Refugee Service of the United States Catholic Conference (USCC) is trying to facilitate the reunification of separated families with relatives in Iron Curtain countries

The Helsinki Declaration, signed in August 1975 by 35 countries, including the U.S., attested to the fact that all people have a basic right of free movement which includes emigration and travel. Unfortunately, although the agreement was signed over a year. ago the process of family reunification has not been progressing as easily as had been anticipated. The Immigration and Refugee Services is working with and has been promised the cooperation of various governmental agencies in their endeavor.
