Beer Cans: A Hot Hobby Item

Do the names St. Claire, Friars, Golden Gate, Soul, Kings, Golden Harp, and St. Louis sound familiar to you? Perhaps you've heard them mentioned. To a beer can connoisseur thèse are the names of rare, obsolete, collectable beer cans.

Beer can collecting is one of America's fastest growing hobbys. The Beer Can (BCCA) is a club that was formed seven years ago to unite beer can enthusiasts. The club now boasts a membership of over 0,000 collectors. The association distributes a bimonthly newsletter, a monthly want ad letter, and holds an annual "canvention"

Collections range in rankfrom "brewery worker" with up to 249 cans, to "grand brewmaster," (1000 or more). Most collectors save empty cans of all sizes, preferably opened from the bottom with a can opener. This helps keep the can looking attractive when it is displayed. Cans of every size, shape, color, age, and nationality cover the walls of collectors' living rooms, dens, basements, garages, and even bedrooms throughout the U.S.

Beer can experts estimate that as many as 12,000 domestic beer labels have been made since the first beer can was introduced in 1935. Some of the first beer were known conetops. They resembled an ordinary beer can with a



for collectors. The BCCA prohibits the buying and selling of beer cans at their meetings and uses trading as the method of exchange. This rule keeps the hobby open to everyone and to those with a limited income.
