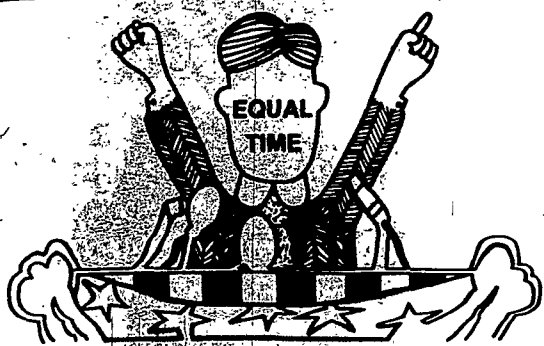

Patrick is also a Regents Scholarship winner. He has applied to the University of

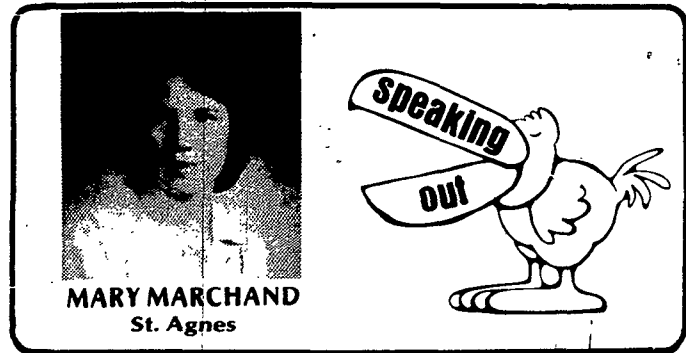
Pennsylvania and Fordham University.

Today, on the continent of Africa, in the country of Uganda another ironfisted dictator rules. President Idi Amin not only has taken advantage of his position, but has abused it. I really don't understand how this man came into power and am not afraid to say that it looks like the country of Uganda is in grave trouble unless immediate action is taken.

The situation is bad. I am frequently reading in the newspapers about the conditions in the country. On Sunday, Feb. 27, an article appeared in the

Democrat & Chronicle which described an eyewitness account of the situation before the person's release from Uganda.

He saw innocent people sent to the prison camps and as prisoners they were forced to beat each other with hammers, and clubs, cut off parts of one's body, and pursue relentless torture. It was either "kill or be killed." Guards brutally massacred those who were helplessly held captive.

It was also stated that President Amin ordered approximately 200 deaths every day for 45 days. At least 9000 lives were taken in a month and a half.

This has not been the first article I have seen. Over a period of months there have been many more describing similar experiences.

President Amin is becoming more powerful and is slowly building a wall around the country he rules. I think that it is time that the United Nations intervened. Uganda is in danger. Amin must be stopped and something must be done now, before once again it's too late.
