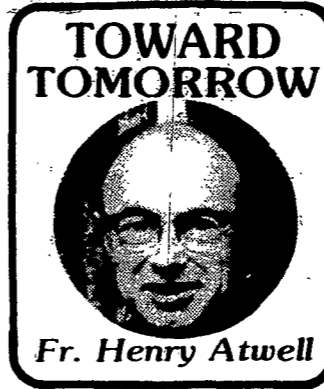

One aspect of the Good Friday Gospel which strikes me so forcefully year after year is Pilate's futile attempt to set Jesus free.

Claudia Procula, Pilate's wife, added her own warning to her husband's troubled conscience. "Have nothing to do with that just man," she told him. Pilate then attempted the ineffectual route of giving the crowd a choice between Jesus or Barabbas and they, of course, shouted for Barabbas.

Pilate then made his infamous and double error — he ignored his own conscience and he ignored the advice of his wife. And that is why to this day we still say that Jesus "suffered under Pontius Pilate."

Pilate tried to salve his conscience, and perhaps appease his wife too, by the weasle-out ritual of washing his hands and claiming he was innocent.

There is an early Christian legend that Claudia Procula later became a Christian and even eventually a saint. Some churches still celebrate her feast day, either on June 25 or on Oct. 27. Pilate himself, the legend says, was sacked from his governorship, exiled to Switzerland, to present day Lucerne, and there he ended his life in suicide. And there are

reports that his ghost can still be seen on misty nights, walking by Lake Lucerne and bending down to wash his hands in his everlastingly hopeless gesture.

The death penalty is always a frightening thing to deal with. We in New York State are now faced with its return. We must be most careful not to become a Pilate State.

Advocates of this final penalty say serious crime deserves serious punishment and only by such punishment can additional serious crime be deterred.

Most present methods of execution in the United States — electrocution, hanging, gas, firing squad — are nonetheless carried out as humanely as possible and as privately as possible, thereby minimizing both the punishment and deterrent factors of the execution.

I cannot understand why death penalty advocates do not, therefore, recommend death by public crucifixion — the suffering is extreme and the impact, we could expect, would be overwhelming.

And then after such grim justice is completed, all those who pulled the switch, or triggered the latch, or turned the valve, or fired the gun, or hammered the nails, and all who watched approvingly, and all who by previous silence had acquiesced, we can all go home and play the Pilate game and say, as he said, "I am innocent."

Then someday our ghost can join the ghost of Pilate and wring our hands in icy waters and wish we had done otherwise.

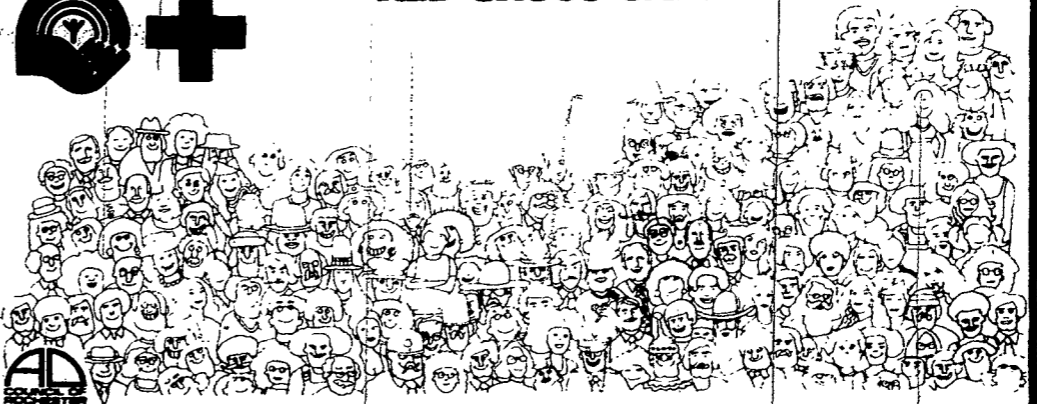
