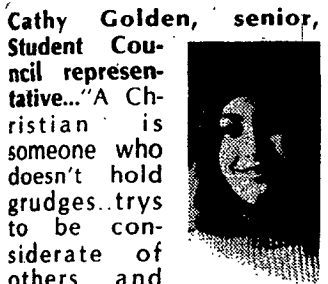
What does being a Christian mean?

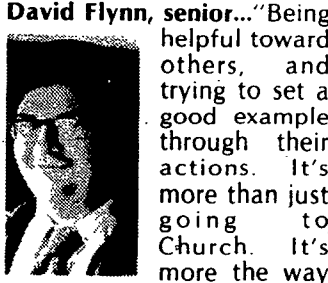
**Diane Carnovale, senior, cheerleader**

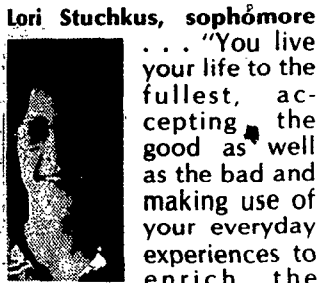
**Jim Feligno, senior, varsity football**

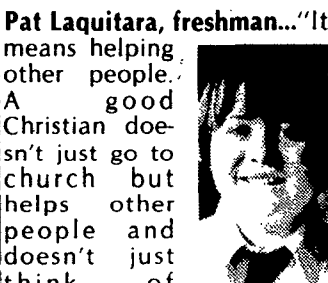
**Cathy Golden, senior, Student Council representative**

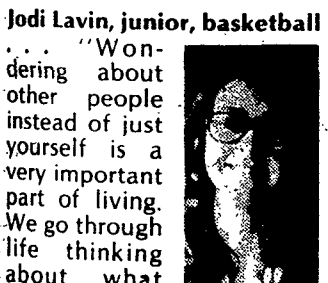
**David Flynn, senior**

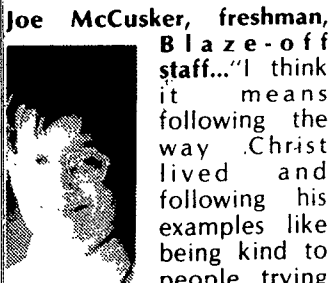
**Lori Stuchkus, sophomore**

## CPR Training

The usual student-teacher role was reversed at Nazareth Academy for one course last month. Junior Meg Rimore, a certified teacher of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), volunteered to teach interested faculty members.

CPR is a technique combining mouth to mouth resuscitation and chest compressions. It is used to save heart attack victims. Mouth-to-mouth breathing pumps oxygen into the lungs and from there into the bloodstream where it refurbishes the body's cells. The compressions squeeze the heart between the breastbone and the backbone to pump blood to the brain and the rest of the body.

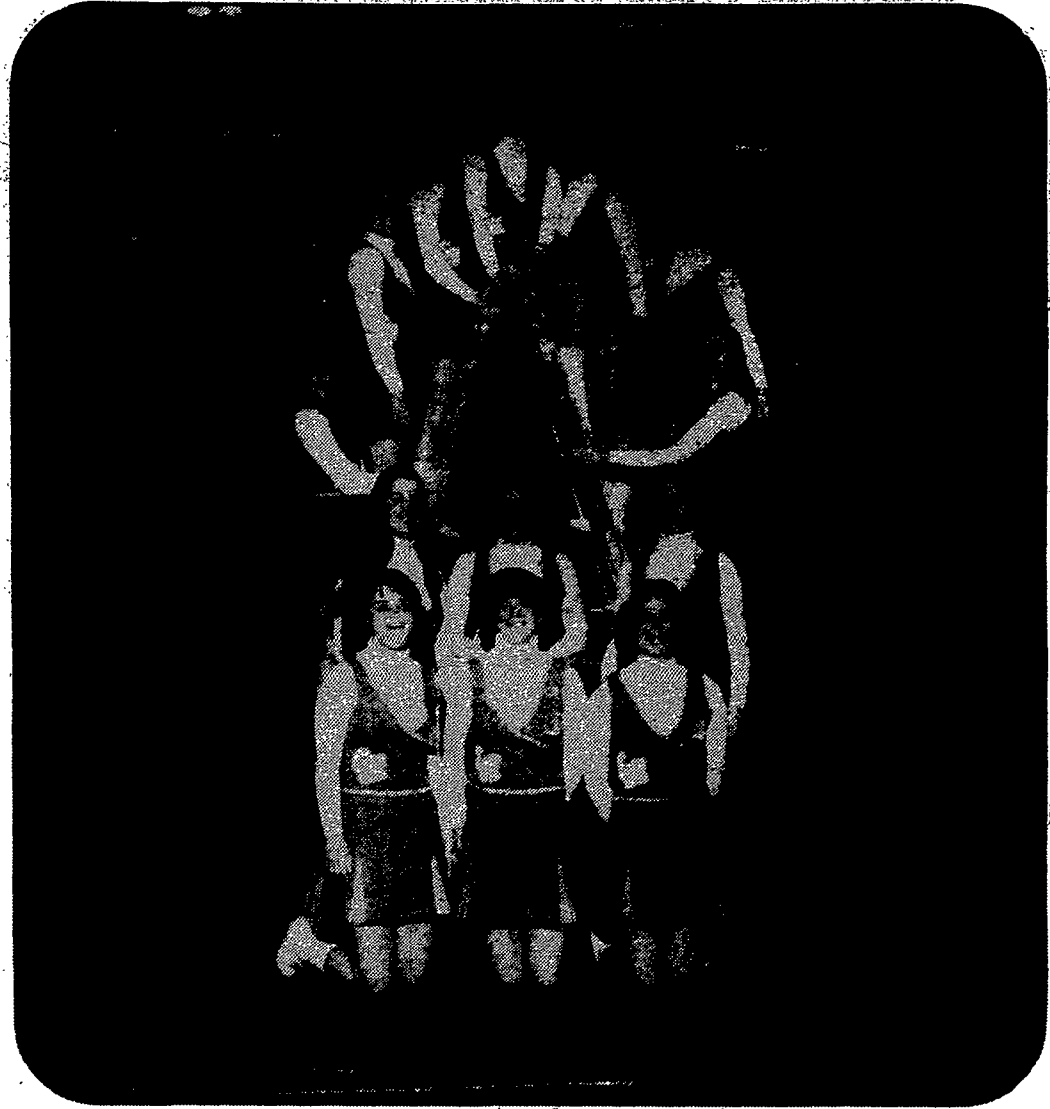
According to Jodi, there was just basketball every year and now with the addition of volleyball, soccer and baseball the school is really on the move.
