Brother Gregory Says Final Vows

Donald P. Bogan, now Brother Gregory, a monk of the community at the Abbey of the Genesee in Piffard, made his solemn profession of vows last Sunday, April 17, in the chapel of the abbey.

His family and friends celebrated the event with him and the community of Trappist monks. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Bogan of Utica.

During his final nine years as a Holy Cross brother, Brother Gregory was charged with the maintenance of Cardinal Mooney High School. Many also will remember him as the coach of track and cross-country there.

At the abbey, besides his engagement in liturgical and monastic studies, he contributes to community life in the areas of baking, plumbing and landscaping.

Merton Society Sets Open Meeting, Film

A documentary film entitled The Last Days of Merton will be shown tomorrow night at Nazareth College at the Spring meeting of the Thomas Merton Society. It includes scenes from the famed Trappist monk's sojourn in Asia and a talk he gave in Bangkok just before his death in 1968.

The program, at 7:30 in the Shults Center forum, is open to the public without charge. Another highlight will be a talk on contemplative prayer by Father William Graf of St. Bernard's Seminary.

The local branch of the Merton Society met for the first time last Fall under the leadership of Msgr. William Shannon, chairman of Nazareth's Department of Religious Studies. Membership now numbers 130.

Thomas Merton first came to public attention about 30 years ago on publication of The Seven Storey Mountain, the story of his struggle to find God. His essays, poems and lectures established him as a leading writer and theologian of these times.

Priests Councils Ask Communion in Hand

The Priests' Councils of New York State have asked New York's bishops to vote for Communion in the hand when the controversial issue is raised next month at the U.S. bishops' meeting in Chicago.

They have recommended also continued development of the Call to Action program and continuation of the consultative process that brought it about.

The PCNY consists of the presidents of the eight diocesan senates of priests in the state, plus two other delegates from each. They met recently at LaGuardia Airport and will assemble again in June to talk with their bishops.

Father George V. Fogarty of the Brooklyn senate was elected president, to succeed Father James Marvin

of Rochester. Father William H. Pape of the Albany body was named vice president.

Irish Cardinal Dies

Armagh, Northern Ireland—William Cardinal Conway, 64, died here last Sunday when he suffered a relapse from an operation.

He was archbishop of Armagh and primate of all Ireland. Cardinal Conway was named head of the country's four and a half million Catholics by Pope Paul in 1965.

Msgr. Baroni Ms. Dolbeare Due Tomorrow

Two nationally known experts in the field of housing will address participants in the annual Bishop Sheen Housing Foundation's Housing Day tomorrow.

Ms. Cushing Dolbeare, executive secretary of the National Rural Housing Coalition, will speak on the problems of rural housing, and Msgr. Geno Baroni, assistant secretary with the Department of Housing and Urban Development, will address the topic from an urban perspective.

Ms. Dolbeare will speak twice, from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the auditorium of the New York State Electric and Gas Company in Horseheads, on Thursday, April 21.

That evening, she will share the dais with Msgr. Baroni at 8 p.m. in a program titled "A Decent Home — Who Can Afford It?" in St. Basil's Hall on Rochester's St. John Fisher College Campus.

Both programs are open to the public free of charge.
