When I travel a distance Hornell is two hours driving time — I make tentative but flexible plans to accomplish as much as possible. Sunday morning I had the pulpit and gave an instruction on "Cominstruction on "Communicating the Word of God", a subject close to my soul. It was occasioned by the TV presentation of the beautiful Jesus of Nazareth. After 12:15 Mass, I lunched on a dish of grapenuts, glanced at the paper, and plopped into bed at 2 p.m., intending to drop off for 4:30 Vespers at the Trappists enroute to Hornell.

About 3:15, bag packed, I found a note: "Father Hart's mother has had a severe heart attack. At St. Mary's Hospital." So vespers gave way to visitation of the sick,

Leaving the hospital at 4:15, the car rolled into Hornell after 6 P.M. The anniversary party was congenial. The dinner was luscious lasagna, meat balls, salad and a mysterious pudding.

My enthusiasm for Communicating the Word has added the very important apostolate of cassette taped lectures and music: not just the Sheen tapes, but many others, including Mother Teresa, Cardinal Suenens, and a

humorist.

Six months ago a Mrs. Fischer of Dubuque, Iowa. wrote: "I conduct tours to many shrines, including St. Anne de Beaupre. Our people are devout. Many are Sisters. I should like to play the Sheen talks; also the old favorite hymns, to add to the devotion of our pilgrims. The bus company has only eight-track. Can 1 get the Sheen talks on eighttrack?"

After 8:30 Mass and a good breakfast, I slipped up to Station WLEA which produces our Magnify the Lord, and Father Brown's Sunday School programs. Then off to Almond to order one of Father Neu's converter gadgets for Mrs. Fischer of Dubuque.

At 11:10 off to Avon for noon-day lunch with Father Atwell, and arrange for the transfer of the keys of the Kingdom of Avon during his two weeks in the Holy land, April 21-May 6.

Short stops at Rush where Father Kress was out; at Shepherd where Good Father Miller showed me the newly revised division of priests' voting blocks. Father Kiggins was in Boston running in the Boston Marathon. Then to Guardian Angels, also in Henrietta where Father Richard Hart had just returned briefly from the hospital.

Finally, home just as the Angelus and the dinner bell struck a simultaneous six o'clock. It had been a good day; and the cassette tape apostolate had prospered.
