

Continued from last week: Package-insert information relative to oral contraceptives. Although the government notes that as yet there is no definitive proof that the pill directly causes cancer, they do warn that "women with a strong family history of breast cancer or who have breast nodules, fibrocystic disease, or who have abnormal mammograms, or who were exposed to the estrogen stilbestrol during their mother's pregnancy must be followed very closely." The pill can cause liver tumors and these can rupture, causing fatal internal bleeding.

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"Oral contraceptives should not be taken by pregnant women because they can damage the developing child." The pill can also cause defects of heart and limbs in the child, and can increase the risk of cervical and vaginal cancer in female children of women who take the pill during pregnancy. Also the government points to evidence that those who become pregnant too soon after getting off the pill have a higher incidence of miscarriages of abnormal children. Women are advised to be off the pill three months before attempting pregnancy. (The government notes too in this connection it is often difficult to conceive after continued use of the pill.)

Women who have used the pill for two years or longer have twice as great a risk as non-users of having gall bladder diseases requiring surgery." Among other effects of pill usage are epilepsy, migranes, kidney diseases, heart diseases, mental depres-sion and anxiety, liver malfunctions, jaundice, high levels of sugar and fat in the blood, and high blood pressure. There are other side effects such as breast tenderness, vomiting, weight changes, skin discoloration, bleeding and menstrual changes.(These are all classified as minor). Among the reported but unconfirmed effects are urinary imbalances, kidney diseases, nervousness, increases in body hair, fluctuations of the sex drive. appetite changes, cataracts and the inability to wear contact lenses (or the need of a new prescription.)

Women are advised by the government to see a physician before starting to resume use of the pill after a


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
