

New Becket Board To Meet Tomorrow

Becket Hall, the diocesan center for men considering vocations to Church life, has a new board of directors.

The board will convene tomorrow evening for the first time. According to Father Thomas Statt, rector of the facility on the St. John Fisher College campus, the composition of the new board, which includes clergy and laymen, is a reflection of the changes "in keeping with the recommendations of Vatican II and Bishop Hogan's own vision of Church that laity and religious work together in areas where heretofore only clergy were involved."

The board which meets tomorrow evening is composed of 21 people of various walks of life in the diocese. By Becket's new constitution, the board will have no less than 15 members nor more than 25. The president of the board will be elected by the board, although Bishop Joseph L. Hogan remains its chairman.

Becket's corporation officers are Bishops Hogan and Dennis W. Hickey, Father William Flynn and Father Statt.

Sisters Council Oks School System Idea

The Diocesan Sisters Council last week unanimously endorsed the concept of an urban Catholic school system, as presented in the working paper recently issued by the Urban Catholic School Ministry Task Force.

The action came after a brief discussion at Saturday's session of the consultative body. The DSC had been presented the paper at an earlier meeting.

Sister Roberta Tierney, SSND, superintendent of Catholic schools, fielded the sisters' questions on the working paper, and also asked for extra time on the council agenda to bring to the forum Rochester City School Board's budget cuts which will eliminate busing of private school students.

She and the diocese have been fighting those budget cuts since they were first announced earlier this year.

The DSC nearly unanimously approved a recommendation that letters be sent to the Mayor and members of City Council, and to the president and members of the City School Board, expressing concern over the budget cuts. The lone dissenter on that vote was Sister Frances Sweeney.

The council also received several informational reports. Among preliminary recommendations to be presented to Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey during the summer from the diocesan Task Force on Vocations, is that the diocese hire a part-time

Catholic League Director Named

Brother Thomas P. Draney, CFC, director of special projects for Catholic School Administrators Association of New York State (CSAANYS), the state-wide professional association for Catholic school principals, has been named director of a regional office of the Catholic League. The office, the first in the four-year history of the Catholic League will be located in the Bronx.

"Anti-defamation and education towards political responsibility are the main thrusts of the League," said Brother Draney, "and its approach is something new for Catholics. It operates independently of the hierarchical structure of the Church, maintaining a direct mail contact with the dues-paying membership. But many clerics and bishops

are members, some even on the Board of Directors. Its whole philosophy is that the kingdom of Caesar and the kingdom of God must be handled by separate structures in order to give each its due."

The Catholic League has undertaken litigation regarding defamation of the Catholic religion, rights of conscience for Catholic doctors and nurses regarding abortion, usurpation by the state of parental control in sex related matters, with minor children, discrimination in hiring Catholics, and anti-Catholic bias in some regulations of the state and federal government, according to a CSAANYS release.

Brother Draney was one of the founders of CSAANYS.
