Right to Life organizations are

N.Y. Assembly Bill 2461, "An Act to amend the education law, in relation to attendance in certain courses of instruction," would allow a "parent or legal guardian of a pupil to request that such pupil be excused from any instruction, class, course and/or unit of instruction which is concerned with moral values, judgments and/or attitudes concerning human reproduction, sexual promiscuity, methods of contraception and abortion provided, however, the provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to courses of instruction in biology, zoology, or general science." The bill, in effect, would prevent the state from usurping the parent's right to guide a child in these sensitive areas.

The Senate version of this bill (S.2016) has already passed the Senate and has gone to the Assembly Education Committee. Assembly Sponsor Flanagan said it was this committee that killed the bill last year, and he was concerned that they might try to stop this legislation again. However, on May 10 the committee met and decided to hold the bill for an amendment. Assemblymen Tom Frey and Andrew Virgilio are members of the Education Committee
