Over at St. Agnes High School, the Social Studies Department is revamping for a new look come next school year.

A new course, Justice, Law and Liberty will be introduced and will incorporate the practical side of American law and system of justice. The course, open to juniors and seniors, will involve law related case studies and an in-depth consideration of the criminal justice system.

Looking for a job is more than knocking on doors and filling out applications. It's a strategy based on individual self-awareness, motivation, employment interests and knowledge of what is available in the job market. This was pointed out by Ms. Joyce Straz-zabasco, CYO program supervisor, who com-mented, "It's knowing how to move through the system."

Recently, Ms. Strazzabosco visited Aquinas with the CYO's "So, you want a job" program which offers students practical job information on the basic labor laws, on how to obtain a social security number, and with a comprehensive list of employment areas to be tapped by job hunters.

staff members as resource persons, has formulated this seminar complete with personal evaluation forms and job market fact sheets.

The evaluation segment's goal was to make the individual aware of his interests and capabilities. The fact sheet contained answers to pertinent questions about the various labor restrictions. How old must a person be to work? When can a minor work full time? According to the fact report, no one under 14 can work, after school or during vacations, with a few exceptions. Anyone 12 or older can deliver newspapers and magazines to homes and businesses and if a person is 12 or 13 he may work harvesting

Ms. Strzzabosco, with two vegetables. Exceptions are also made for child performers and models. In answer to the latter question anyone 17 may work full time throughout the year. If 16, he may work full time during vacations and when no longer attending school.

> Included on the fact sheet's list of employment areas are supermarkets, restaurants, amusement parks, landscaping and hospitals.

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Ms. Strazzabosco impressed upon her listeners the idea that they were salesmen with a product themselves, and that like salesmen it is critical they know their product by being aware of their skills and weaknesses so that they present an image of confidence to prospective employers.
