Filter Drive Off To Flying Start

Response to the Courier-Journal Filter Campaign in the first two days since its announcement has been "very lively," according to Anthony J. Costello, general manager.

More than 100 families have ordered filters in the first two days of the campaign, according to Costello. "There hasn't been much time for response because of the holiday," he said, "but it is a promising beginning."

The campaign is being conducted with the aim of having 1,800 families in this diocese pledge \$10 each, the cost of one water filter, so that 1,800 families in Bela Villa, a development for impoverished people in Brazil, may drink

The Brazilian families gather their water from communal spigots. The filters will enable them to run the water through the mechanism, decontaminating the water of worm organisms which constitute a very prevalent illness among children.

Sister Katherine of the Sisters of St. Joseph who serve as missionaries in Brazil, will supervise the distribution of the filters. Recipients will be required to attend three classes on their use and on other aspects of personal hygiene before acquiring the filters.

St. James Hospital, Bethesda Plan Merger

Hornell - The directors of St. James Mercy Hospital and Bethesda Hospital here have approved the concept of a corporate merger of the two institutions.

Current plans are for a management committee to plan the specifics of the merger; a legal study also is

The Bethesda Hospital board approved the merger concept May 19, and the St. James board concurred the following evening.

The St. James board's resolution noted that the two boards "are desirous of improving the quality of health care," and "the and "the concept of corporate merger is the most efficient, effective and economical means of improving health care in the Hornell area.

A merger, the statement noted, "means a merging of both boards, the pooling of assets and liabilities and a complete reorganization of the two institutions, coordination and relocation of all services necessary to effect a total elimination of

duplication of effort and

Sister Mary Rene McNiff. hospital administrator, noted that the discussion began when Bethesda, the smaller of the two facilities, came under pressure because of its low occupancy rate. Discussion originally dealt with the consolidation of services, with trade-offs to reduce duplication. Sister Rene said that merger became the subject when people realized that there "is a limitation on how much you can share and still keep in financial balance.

St. James is the larger of the facilities, with 144 acute care beds; Bethesda has 90. During the past five years, St. James has had an average loss of \$31,000, while Bethesda has averaged a \$72,000 loss.

St. James is not large enough to assume the health care needs of the community, Sister Rene noted, and the continued operation of the two facilities is necessary. Specific departments and services are expected to come under discussion during merger talks.

The St. James board's statement says that the merger should "assure that the Sisters of Mercy can be employed at both locations," and "assure that both locations provide for the spiritual care of patients through the expansion of the Pastoral Care Department" of St. James.
