### Father Robinson to Speak At DPC June Convocation

Father Jerome Robinson, OP, diocesan Director of Black Ministries will be the keynote speaker for the third Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) Convocation at Becket Hall Friday night, June 10, and Saturday, June 11.

Father Robinson's talk Friday will stress the importance of ministry. He also will lead off the Saturday activities, as he will speak on how DPC members can realign, reassess, and reawaken to be ministers to the Church of Rochester.

Joseph Meicier, current DPC chairman, will welcome the 40 elected members and 11 appointed members to the meeting, the first of the 1977-78 council. Bishop Joseph L. Hogan also will address the council Friday night.

Other activities on Saturday include election of officers, standing committee meetings, and workshops. The council also will work on a draft of specific topics for discussion and action during the year.

Families of DPC members are encouraged to attend the closing liturgy, beginning at 4 p.m., and the refreshments that follow.

Sister Mary Ann Binsack, DPC executive secretary, noted that "as the Diocesan Pastoral Council embarks on its third year, we ask your

prayers for the representatives to this body that they be filled with the Spirit of Christ and thus be able, with our Bishop, to 'witness the Gospel's radical demands in our world' and 'provide for the ongoing needs of the people of God,' as expressed in the DPC Constitution.
