

# New Cardinal A Future Pope?

Rome — Pope Paul last week named his top aide to the Archbishopric of Florence and at the same time elevated him to the rank of cardinal, thus placing the 56-year-old priest among the front-runners of successors to the throne of Peter, according to Vatican observers.

Archbishop Giovanni Benelli has served the past 10 years as deputy secretary of state, a position seen as the second most powerful in the Vatican. Among Archbishop Benelli's duties were to screen appointments and papers for

the pope.

Pope Paul once served in the same capacity for Pope Pius XII.

When the papacy becomes vacant, the cardinals are called into meeting and a new pontiff is elected, traditionally from one of their number.

Among others mentioned as papabili, strong contenders for the papacy, are Cardinal Sebastiano Baggio, head of the Congregation of the Vatican Council and Cardinal Sergio Pignedoli, chairman of the Secretariat

for Non-Christian Religions.

Archbishop Benelli will succeed Cardinal Ermengildo Florit, who is retiring at the age of 75. The new cardinal will formally be elevated to the rank on June 27.

Pope Paul also named four other new cardinals. The naming of one of them indicates improvements between the Vatican and the government of Czechoslovakia.

Bishop Frantisek Tomasek, the apostolic administrator of Prague,

was secretly named a cardinal last year, the pontiff said.

Such secret elevation to the cardinalate is used when the announcement of his name would create difficulties for the new cardinal.

Other cardinals to be elevated this month are: Archbishop Bernardin Gantin of Cotonou, Benin; Archbishop Joseph Ratzinger of Munich and Frisinga, and Msgr. Luigi Ciappi, a Vatican theologian.

## Chest Proposes 'Packaging' Services

The Community Chest proposes that social services to families and individuals be consolidated at neighborhood centers strategically placed throughout the city and county.

There should be closer collaboration between private and public agencies and private funds should be put to greater use in attracting public funds, according to a report accepted by the Chest board of directors.

The report represents a year's study by a citizens' committee headed by Jeanne B. Hutchins. The services in question, she said, take more than \$7.5 million of Chest contributions. They include counseling, adoption, day care, homemaking help and family support services. There is sufficient information about the composition of neighborhoods and the needs of clients to show where centers should be located, she said.

"We're not talking about huge new agencies with huge new staffs," Thomas Swartz, CC planner, said. "We're talking about a package of services." He pointed out that at present services are dispersed and not always accessible to those who need help.

## NY Senate Gives Okay To ConCon

Albany, N.Y. (RNS) — The New York Senate has voted 35-22 in favor of a resolution supporting an anti-abortion amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

The resolution asked Congress to call a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of adopting an anti-abortion amendment. Officials here said the resolution had virtually no chance of passing in the State Assembly.

Eight state legislatures, to date, have called for an anti-abortion amendment to the U.S. Constitution, according to a New York Times report. Endorsement of 34 states is required to call a Constitutional Convention.

The Times noted that the convention method of amending the Constitution has never been used; that all of the existing constitutional amendments have originated in Congress and then been ratified by three-quarters of the state legislatures.

Too often, well-meaning people at the funeral say: "Be brave! Don't cry! Don't take it so hard!"

But why not? Tears are a natural tribute that can be paid to the one who is gone. The bereaved misses the deceased. How he wishes that the one he loved were still alive.

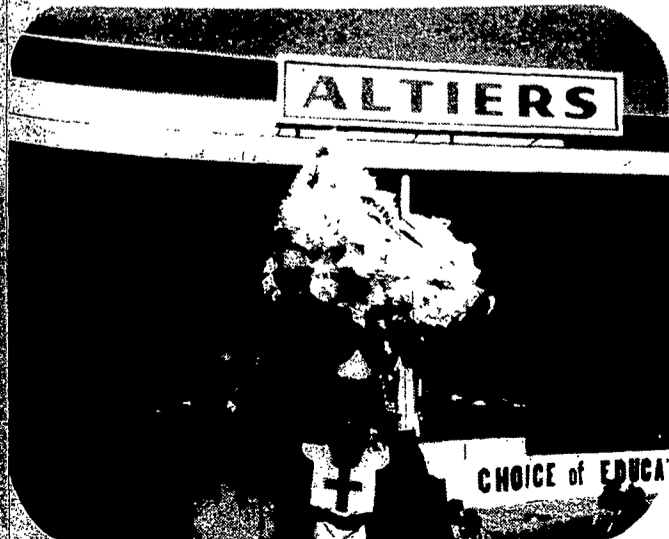
Emotions of grief are normal reactions necessary for health. Death has so many overtones: loneliness, fear, ambivalence, anger, guilt and hostility. There is nothing shameful or unacceptable in these feelings.

The mourner who denies them or stoically keeps his emotions bottled up inside may later find a release in a more serious physical explosion to his inner makeup. Therefore, it is good to encourage an outward expression or feelings. There is no time clock for emotions, nor can they be intellectualized. Just as joy shared is joy increased, grief shared is grief diminished.

Encourage the mourner to tell you what he feels, rather than trying to prescribe how he should feel.
