The bishops' meeting in Chicago put the last nail in the coffin of the "Call to Action" charade—despite what you may have read in the "National Catholic Reporter." (Their news stories get closer to fiction each week. See, for example, the account of the National Educational Association meeting in San Francisco.) I gather that a couple of bishops (not including the one in Wisconsin, incidentally) have been giving me credit for bringing it down "single-handed."

I wish this were true. The attempt of the "social action-urban ministry-peace and justice" bureaucrats to seize power in the name of the Catholic people was one of the most pernicious things to have happened in the American church in recent years. But I don't have enough clout in the church to bring down a kindergarten running back. And the "call to action" was so ineptly executed that it fell of its own dead weight.

If you organize a meeting purporting to speak for the Catholic people and you have any intelligence at all, you arrange things so that two-thirds of the delegates are not employees of the church.

I've lost some friends because of my opposition to the "Call to Action." Liberal bureaucrats take even less kindly to criticism than do conservative ones. The best of the liberal bureaucrats have always insisted on two pillars of "social action": representative democracy and professional competence. Not even the most enthusiastic supporters of the "Call to Action" would deny that the meeting was innocent of both these qualities.

My former friends, it seems to me, stand condemned by their own principles

But harm done to the church by the Detroit tent show will persist for a long time. The new bishops who believe in authentic representative democracy in the church will have to wait for years for the unpleasant memories of the "Call to Action" to die. I would guess that the Detroit meeting set representative democracy in the church back by at least a decade. Even worse, the opportunity to use the resources of its own younger generation of scholars and administrators was wasted. The "communal Catholics" in their thirties, who are good at what they do, were not brought into the preparation for the meeting. Indeed, most of them were unaware that it happened. They were not troubled because long ago they gave up on the institutional church. As one young woman with an important political-administrative position put it to me, "The church is incapable of doing anything which isn't cheap and second-rate."

I'm a scholar who cares about the institutional church. I knew about the meeting and was horrified by it. The communal Catholic scholars simply didn't care. Maybe they were correct. Maybe the American church cannot do anything that has quality in it. The meeting didn't turn them off because they paid no attention to it.

Yet the church's chances of ever challenging them were badly hurt by the "Call to Action." Once you commit yourself publicly to illiterate rubbish, the barriers don't come down easily even if the rubbish is buried in committees

Though nothing will come from the "Call to Action," the institutional church is stuck with it. Until it can divest itself of the albatross of the Detroit meeting, the church will not be able psychologically to begin conversations with its own "communal" intelligentsia. Another ten years?

This is a good opportunity to thank the Catholic Press Association for their award. It was a delightful surprise. Having taken on both "Humanae Vitae" and the "Call to Action" within six months, I fully expected to get thrown out of the Catholic press. I am grateful for the vote of confidence of those responsible for the award
