



Father Charles Gusmer To Lead Area Institute

Parish Prayer will be the theme of the 1977 Diocesan Liturgy Institute, slated this year for Aug. 19-20 at Keuka College near Penn Yan.

He has served on several summer faculties including the University of Notre Dame and St. John's University in Collegeville.

In addition, he has published articles in many journals and magazines.

Eight workshop sessions will be offered by area experts on various topics related to parish prayer.

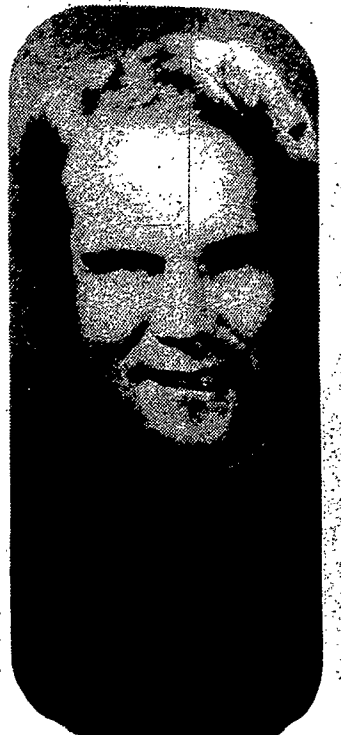
These sessions will deal with the psalms, music, movement and atmosphere. Liturgical art displays, activities and celebrations of the Liturgy of the Hours are planned to complete the program.

Father Charles W. Gusmer, a priest of the Newark Archdiocese and a professor of Liturgy and Sacramental Theology at Immaculate Conception Seminary in Mahwah, N.J., will deliver the keynote address

Father Gusmer's theme will be The Many Faces of Parish Prayer. He also will conduct a general session on The Eucharistic Prayer of the Community

Father Gusmer is president of the North American Academy of Liturgy and is chairman of the archdiocesan Commission for Divine Worship.

Labor and the Church Focus of OHD Forum

An open forum on Labor and the Church will be held Monday, July 25, from 6 until 10 p.m., at the Office of Human Development. Staff members have prepared a number of presentations they think might interest members of parish human development committees, union members, priests and people in general.

Tim McGowan, in charge of the agency's political section, will discuss experiments and new directions, such as the "humanization" of work, and management and control by the workers. Kevin Cullen, education chairman, will talk about Church teachings on labor. John Salter, new director of the office, will trace the

origins and development of the labor movement in the United States and analyze current issues and challenges.

The OHD is on the grounds of Ss. Peter and Paul Church at 750 West Main, but should be approached from Brown Street, at the rear of the property, where the parking lot is located.

Focus on World's Needy Children

As reported by a Holy Childhood news release, Bishop Julien Guet, general secretary of the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood, emphasized the importance of the work that Holy Childhood is doing to help the world's underprivileged children in his address at the Association's general

meeting in Paris last month. Bishop Guet told the directors of the urgent needs of these children and the missionaries who are helping them. "Many children die," he said, "from relatively harmless diseases because they are more vulnerable from malnutrition. Millions more in their earliest years have

food so lacking in protein that their brains are damaged forever."

Working through the Holy Childhood, children in more than 40 countries have shown their concern for others by contributing approximately \$4.5 million to provide food, clothing, medical care and education to children in 94 mission countries. Here in the U. S., students in Catholic schools and religious education classes have demonstrated what they are capable of doing on their own to help those in need through such projects as the Holy Childhood Christmas seal program, Lenten sacrifices and general mission education and sharing programs throughout the school year.
