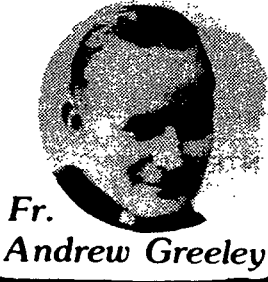

## The Church 1977

The Knights of Columbus are gathering shortly in Indianapolis under new leadership. I have a suggestion for them to ponder: They ought to fund either a chair or two in Catholic immigrant history or at least a number of fellowships for graduate students to do research on Catholic immigrant history. The only provision they should impose is that some of the history be done on the Knights themselves.

My friend Arthur Mann — the Morton Distinguished Professor of History at the University of Chicago — has been trying for some time to find graduate students to do research on the Knights. He argues they were an extremely important part of Catholic immigrant experience and that the K.C. beat the Bnai Brith into anti-defamation work by several decades.

If the Knights are looking for a new sense of direction — and I guess they might be — it might make a lot of sense to study their own past. I think they might be pleasantly surprised by much of what they would find.

In the turn of the century era, before the radio and the family motor car, the K.C. clubhouse was a critical community center for first and second generation Catholics in a mostly hostile urban environment. Unless the Knights are seen as a response to anti-immigrant nativist hostility, their importance in the first part of this century simply cannot be grasped. My father, who was both a political and social liberal,

counted his K.C. Council second only to his family in importance. Reflecting back on it after his death, we were not quite sure why so much of his life was invested in an organization whose purpose we did not understand. It was Professor Mann's suggestion about immigrant history which made the pieces fit together.

My earliest memories are of the K.C. "Country Club" in Wisconsin where our family spent its summers. It was, to put the matter mildly, not a country club like the suburban "clubs" of today. Still, for the pre-family-car era of the 1930s, it was a nice place to grow up.

Before my own interest in the immigrant experience, it never occurred to me to

wonder why Catholics would need a "country club" of their own. "Barry" (as in Commodore John, of course) was a response to nativist hostility. No accident that it was founded in the 1920s when the first and second generation middle class was suffering through that era's surge of nativist bigotry.

I guess my hunch is that the anti-defamation work which the Knights did 70 years ago never really was finished. Too soon did we permit ourselves to think nativism had been routed from society. I'm not suggesting that the Knights go back to that task — though someone ought to. I am suggesting that we need to know more about their story if we wish to understand the immigrant experience.

# St. Paul Priests Ask Sabbaticals

**St. Paul, Minn. (RNS) —** A proposal to give every priest of the Catholic Archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis a three-month sabbatical after each seven years of service has been endorsed by the Priests' Senate

by the archdiocese. The archdiocese also would provide each priest with an additional grant of \$1,000 for such expenses as tuition, room and board and travel.

The senate suggested that replacements for priests on sabbaticals be obtained from religious orders and educational institutions.

A policy statement approved by the senate said that a sabbatical is "part of the normal pattern of growth in a priest's ministry. It is not extensive study for the sake of a new or specialized ministry. It is also not an extended vacation, sick leave or leave of absence."
