# **Learning Disability Teacher Added to Catholic System**

Elmira – A learning disabilities teacher has been added to the program of the Chemung County Catholic School system for the coming year. Sister Robertina Finegan, formerly a teacher at St. Patrick's Junior High, will divide her time among the four schools this year, working with students having difficulty learning

Sister Robertina isn't a stranger to the field, as she holds a masters degree in learning disabilities from Fairfield University, and has worked with students on special problems in the past. She also has conducted a Summer school this Summer, working with Catholic as well as some public school students.

Sister Robertina will spend much of her time screening kindergarten students and diagnosing students referred to her by classroom teachers, Sister Joan Cawley, junior high principal, explained. The screening of kindergarten students is designed to discover potential problems before they slow a student's progress Students having difficulty will be tested, and Sister Robertina will determine what course of action will benefit each student She will then help the classroom teacher and the teacher aides to implement the plan for the student She also will work with classroom teachers, increasing their knowledge of learning disabilities and of how to work with learning disabled students

Sister Joan commented that some of the students Sister Robertina will work with are merely behind their classmates, and don't have a specific disability For those students, she will prepare a program designed to bring them up to grade level

### **Br. Feerick Joins** BK as Principal

Brother Thomas Feerick who has taken over the reins as principal of Bishop Kearney High School has had an educational career which has included teaching at the elementary and secondary levels in-terspersed with athletic coaching and directing assignments as well as administrative positions.

Brother received his BA from Iona College and his MA in Sociology from St. John's University in New York. He has done additional graduate work at Holy Cross University, Boston College, Catholic University of America and the University of Hawaii.

Brother spent five years 1965-70 in Honolulu as assistant principal, school treasurer and community bursar at Damien Memorial High School. In 1971, after a year of teaching at Bergen High School in New Jersey, Brother was assigned as Principal to Bishop Hendricken High School in Rhode Island.

The school, according to accounts, with only 430 students was on the brink of closing but under the direction of Brother Feerick, made a turnabout and now has an enrollment of 850.

This number is dwarfed by Bishop Kearney's 2000 students whom Brother will meet in a few weeks. But in talking with him he didn't sound daunted. At present, with having just arrived on the scene, he is thinking in terms of financial stability, "Trying to set up a budget that is realistic," he explained.
