Bishops to Study Call to Action Plan At May Meeting

Washington, D.C. (RNS) - A "broad based plan" for social justice, emanating from the 1976 Bicentennial Call to Action conference of the U.S. Catholic bishops in Detroit, will be submitted to the bishops' general meeting in May.

According to Archbishop John Roach of St. Paul-Minneapolis, chairman of the ad hoc committee on Call to Action for the U.S. bishops, preliminary reports from committees studying the 1976 Detroit conference were received and he expects that most of the committees "will be in a position to inform us of their evaluations" early next year.

He said his committee will then begin to develop the proposed "plan of action" for the bishops' conference and submit it to the May 1978 meeting in Chicago.

Archbishop Roach, in making his report to the Administrative Committee of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB), noted that the charge given his committee is threefold: "to develop a five-year plan of action in consultation with the NCCB-USCC committees, carry out oversight functions in relation to the proposed plan, and to report for the next five years to the body of bishops on the implementation of that plan."

The archbishop said the expectation is that "we are engaged in a process of moving the NCCB-USCC into most of the directions and areas addressed in the Detroit resolutions." Noting that the eventual plan of action developed by his

committee may be more "modest in scope" than the 182 Detroit recommendations suggest, the prelate held that the plan will set priorities and focus on the social mission of the Church.

Besides Archbishop Roach, those serving on the ad hoc committee are Archbishop Thomas Donnellan of Atlanta, Archbishop Peter Corley of Newark, Bishop Joseph Howze of Biloxi, Miss., Bishops Joseph McNicholas of Springfield, Ill., and Auxiliary Bishop Manuel Moreno of Los Angeles.

Altar Girls?

St. Paul, Minn. (RNS) - The National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB) has asked the Vatican to permit females to serve as altar servers, according to Archbishop John R. Roach of the Archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis.

No response has been received yet, the archbishop said, answering a question raised by a viewer of a local educational television program on which he appeared.

The archbishop is chairman of the bishops' ad hoc committee to oversee the implementation of the recommendations of the Call to Action conference in Detroit last year.

36,000 Expected At Charismatic Meet

Atlantic City, N.J. (RNS) - Some 36,000 charismatic Christians from the eastern U.S. are expected to take part in a three-day Eastern Regional Conference on the Charismatic Renewal in the Catholic Church Oct. 21 to 23 here.

Focus will be on the tensions arising between life in an increasingly secular and materialistic society and the call to live "totally under the Lordship of Jesus Christ," a spokesperson said. "This tension helps us to see our total and complete need for God."

Principal speakers will include Catherine de Jueck Doherty, foundress of Madonna House, Combermere, Ont.; Father John Haughey, S.J., author and member of the Woodstock Theological Research Center; Dr. David du Plessis, a Pentecostal leader; Father

John Bertolucci, a priest from Albany, N.Y., widely known in the charismatic movement; Bobbie Cavar, a leader of the Community of God's Delight, Dallas, and Ruth Carter Stapleton, a lay evangelist and sister of President Jimmy Carter.

Felici Gets Top Post

Vatican City (RNS) - The Vatican announced that Pope Paul appointed Cardinal Pericle Felici, 66, as prefect of the Supreme Tribunal of the Apostolic Signatura - the supreme court of the Church.

Cardinal Felici, who is president of the Pontifical Commission for Revision of the Code of Canon Law, succeeds Cardinal Dino Staffa, who died Aug. 7.

The Apostolic Signatura's principal concerns are to resolve questions concerning juridical procedure and to supervise the observance of laws and rights at the highest level. It also is the supreme court of Vatican City State.
