Penfield Parish Takes Census

Penfield's Church of the Holy Spirit, at Plank and Hatch roads, will take a census this weekend. The 2,900 houses and apartment units within the parish boundaries will be canvassed by 230 parishioners Oct 1 and 2

Father Frederick Bush, pastor, said that Sunday congregations now included more than 1,000 families, more than twice the original membership of the 12-year-old parish. The census will enable him to bring office records up to date and will give all Catholics living in the area information about Holy Spirit. Canvassers will distribute a survey form inviting the expression of opinion on parish programs and offering parishioners an opportunity to volunteer their time and talents to the

work of the church. A steering committee of 12 has been working on the project since April, under the direction of Mrs. Gina Ciuvelone. Joseph De Paolis and Mary Anne Palermo are in charge.

ON THE RIGHT SIDE

Fr. Paul J. Cuddy

A letter to Father Bill Cuddy of Syracuse, my nephew:

For a few weeks I have been filling in on Wednesdays and Thursdays at the Canandaigua V.A. Hospital. Last week I went to see a new patient, and introduced myself. "I'm Father Cuddy and am here to welcome you." He beamed. "Why, a Father Cuddy brought me here yesterday from Syracuse." "He's my nephew." "He's a good friend of mine." "Well, I hope all priests are good friends to everybody, and I'm glad he is a friend of yours."

Last Friday I said to the household here, "I haven't been to Auburn in a month, and must get to see my sick sister in Syracuse. Will be back late tonight."

In preparation for the 70-mile trip, plus 20 extra to Syracuse, I selected five cassette tapes to listen to. I hope you have a tape player in your rattle-trap. Every priest should have one. We spend a lot of valuable time on the road. The player turns the car into a mobile lecture hall.

The roundtrip would take over four hours, hence the diversity of tapes: 1) Mother Teresa of Calcutta—her Notre Dame talk at Baltimore, which is her best; 2) Evangelization and the

Priest-Journalist, by Jesuit Father Kenneth Baker, editor of the Homiletic Review; 3) Theological Pluralism within the Church, by Father William Smith, moral theologian at Dunwoodie. It is a critique of the moral theology of our own Fr. Charlie Curran. To lighten things, a hilarious tape by Hal Roach, an Irish comedian, and a selection of Latin Motets beautifully sung by Old St. Bernard's Choir, under the direction of Father Charles McCarthy in the late 50's.

At noon, I got to Holy Family to lunch with those who gather there. Fridays Msgr. Sullivan and Fathers Downs, Stokes, Wahl, Hendl and Antinelli were there. At 3 p.m. I phoned your father. "Are you free to go to Syracuse to see Sis McLane?" "Gosh, I wish I could, but I have an appointment in an hour." So I phoned your Aunt Florence, the legionnaire. She said, "Fine. I've been wanting to get there." "Good. I'll pick you up at 4 p.m. We can stop at Col. Sanders and get a bucket of chicken. I have a basket of nice peaches. We'll have supper with her."

Even though Sis is pretty hazy, she was happy to see us. Brian McLane came at 6. So with a nice couple who are taking care of Sis, we had a good evening together.

On the return I said, "I am dejected not to have gotten to Fr. John Dillon's father's funeral last week. Let's stop in on Mary Dillon." She is Father Curtin's niece, and Nick was buried before I knew he had died. We had a fine visit, and just missed Fr. John, who had left for Utica only 15 minutes before.

About 10 p.m., the return to Webster. The night was mean, dark, rainy, 70 miles

at 40-45 miles an hour would have been an agony without the tapes. I chose Father Smith's Pluralism of Father Curran, which kept me wide awake. Off through Savannah, Clyde, North Rose, and noticed the gas gauge registered low. No stations open. As the car came to Williamson it was clear the gas would not last the final 20 miles.

Now, at Williamson, there is a State Trooper barracks. It was near midnight when I drove into the yard. Seven handsome troopers stared at me as if I were an apparition, until I said, "I need help. I'm stationed in Webster but am about out of gas. Can you help me?" One smiled. "We can't sell you any, or give the state's gas away. But we'll take care of you." Two troopers disappeared for 10 minutes, and I had a great chat with the others, including young Marchetti, who had been my altar boy in Clyde 15 years ago. The two returned and sent me off with enough gas to get home.

After midnight I rolled into the garage with the prayer, "Oh, Blessed Lord, if has been a good day. And please, Lord, a double blessing on those Williamson troopers. Amen."

It surely bids to be a fascinating trip, with Indian and Spanish civilization so curiously intertwined.
