Little Irish Show Strength

That 6-0 opening season botball loss at Auburn High in the rain and mud in aburn was not a fair issessment of the 1977 edition of the Little Irish at Aguinas Institute.

At the same time, rival Bishop Kearney was out in its opener pounding its reighborhood buddy lrondequoit, 33-14; the following weekend the Irish met the Kings and the Dewey Avenue gridders ruled the evening at Holleder Stadium with a solid 21-7 victory over the Kearney eleven.

Now — as before the season — Aquinas remains the choice as the successor to the City-Catholic League throne held for the past three years by arch-rival McQuaid.

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The Knights themselves are having problems getting started, dropping their first two ballgames to Monroe and Cardinal Mooney.

But, back to the Little Irish for now.

Coach Nick Teta's youngsters evened their record at 1-1 overall with the win over BK in a game thought by many to be an early season scrap for the City-Catholic League Division I championship.

Teta, however, plays his games one at a time and when interviewed, was more concerned about Saturday's scrap with C-C contender Madison which went into battle with shutout victories over Edison and Franklin.

(Aquinas defeated Madison, 19-0, for its second win in three games).

Auburn was out-distanced by the Irish in every department but scoring, and as Teta explains, the home team's only TD came at a time when his youngsters were caught making a huge defensive mistake up front on the line.

"We played real well, they are a good football team, we probably played as well there as we did against Kearney," Teta says One major difference in the BK contest was the weather — no rain or mud — and the Irish made the most of it with good passing from junior quarterback Mark Magliocco, and good running from senior fullback Larry Finucane and junior halfback Bob Paternico.

Magliocco for example, was unable to complete a single pass in eight tries in the rain against Auburn; he completed four of nine for 86 yards against the Kings, setting up two Irish TDs in the process.

Finucane carried 18 times for 61 yards; Paternico logged 53 yards in 15 tries against Kearney.

If Teta had any misgivings about his defense, he can go on to other things; the Irish defense held BK to 130 yards total offense (after BK piled up 465 a week earlier against Irondequoit) and the Kings' fleet-footed Alvin English was limited to but eight yards in seven carries (after hitting 101 yards the week before against the Indians).

One advantage the Irish had over the Kings was the fact that most of the starting team watched the BK-Irondequoit game and checked out their specific opponents in advance.

BK players did not enjoy that luxury, although BK Coach Don Della Vella scouted the Aquinas at Auburn contest.

"We tell them to go out and watch the other teams play; to watch their positions and things like that," Teta says. "They go watch the teams we're worried about," he adds.

Teta has a handle on Monroe County League teams; the Irish scrimmage preseason at East Rochester and went up against ER, Brighton, Webster Thomas and Hornell.

He also thinks, at least for public consumption, that R-H Sperry, Fairport and Webster Schroeder belong ahead of his gridders in the local coaches poll.

Sperry in the season's finale, Saturday, Nov. 12, at the University of Rochester's Fauver Stadium.

Aquinas has the manpower to plug in separate offensive and defensive units with the exception of three "both-way" performers in Finucane and linemen Dick Loundsbury and Dave Lester.

Besides Magliocco (QB), Finucane (FB) and Paternico (HB) in the backfield, the Irish bank on Phil, Casale, another senior, at the other halfback post.

Of the foursome, only Finucane started on last year's Aquinas team which finished 3-5-1 overall.

Jerry Gallipeau, a senior who did start a year ago, is first man in when Teta needs to rotate his backs.

Up front, from left to right, are senior end Tom Mona, junior tackle Steve DiLaura, senior guard Jim Philbin, junior center Dom DelVecchio, senior guard Mike Spoleta, senior tackle Loundsbury, and senior end Lester.

Mona, Lester, Philbin and DiLaura all started last year.


The defensive secondary includes Mike Schrader, Vince Battaglia, and Gallipeau, all seniors.
