Father Joseph Reinhart is glad they ask. Here is his explanation:

"These lists are supplied by the U.S. Catholic Mission Council in Washington, D.C. They name only people who are serving outside the United States and, who claim Rochester as their home diocese. They are more complete than any other information we have here at the Propagation of the Faith office, yet we know that they are not necessarily complete. This year, for instance, I added the names of our diocesan Sisters of St. Joseph who are in Brazil. And last year, for instance, Sister Mary Lou was left out - she was in the United States when last year's list was compiled. I guess she was still here when the latest list was made up; it's dated Aug. 8.

"We find that the only way we can find out who's missing is to publish the list and wait for complaints. We really hope for complaints."

Charities Anniversary Noted

Catholic Charities of the diocese of Rochester marked its 60th anniversary Oct. 14 with a dinner at the Otto A. Shults Community Center on the Nazareth College Campus on East Avenue.

which briefly outlined 11 charities plans for the future.

Maurice Tierney, diocesan director of Catholic Charities, explained that one major improvement his organization has dedicated itself to is to expand its services beyond Monroe County. "We are deeply concerned in our lack of presence outside Monroe County. Our board of directors, urged on by our bishop, has begun the task of solving that problem," he said.

Bishop Howard J. Hubbard, bishop of the diocese of Albany and very active in Charities, compared the work done by Catholic Charities organizations with the work of Christ.

He told the 170 who attended that when people felt pain it is their work to relieve it, if the people need help their job is to provide it.

Bishop Hubbard outlined the future of Charities organizations by stressing the need for "decentralization and ecumenical coalitions."

Progress in that area has already begun with the opening of the Kinship Group Home in Perkinsville. The purpose of this agency is to maintain and operate a group home for adolescent boys.
