Casa Begun At Nazareth

Dr. Enrico de Maio, the Italian consul in New York City, conveyed congratulations from the Italian government at groundbreaking ceremonies last Thursday at Nazareth College for its "casa Italiana." The ceremony took place at a construction site between the arts center and East Avenue.

The "casa" is a gift from Rochester's Italian-American

community to the college and will serve as headquarters for the college's Center for Italian Studies. Only one other such "casa" exists in the United States, at Columbia University.

Costanza 'Joke' Draws Apology

New York (RNS) — Presidential Aide Margaret "Midge" Costanza has been criticized with having "bad taste" for her joking remarks about a Catholic priest who "spent the last hour with his hand on my knee."

Speaking at a meeting of 300 Italian-American community representatives, Ms. Costanza referred to

Father Louis Gigante, Bronx City Councilman, who was in the audience. They had met on previous occasions.

"Father G., when he first met me thought I was a nun," she said, noting that the impression was quickly dispelled by her blunt language. She said she had been sitting next to the priest before her speech.

"He's had his hand on my knee for the last hour," Ms. Costanza said in an apparent effort to joke. The "joke" reportedly generated no response from the audience.

Father Gigante said he was "offended" by the remark but did not want to make an issue of it at the meeting.

"I thought she made a fool of herself, that she was completely out of order," the priest said. "She may not have intended any disrespect but in such a forum it was very, very bad taste."

Ms. Costanza said later that she was "hurt" by the furor caused by her remarks and that she would apologize to Father Gigante if she had offended him.
