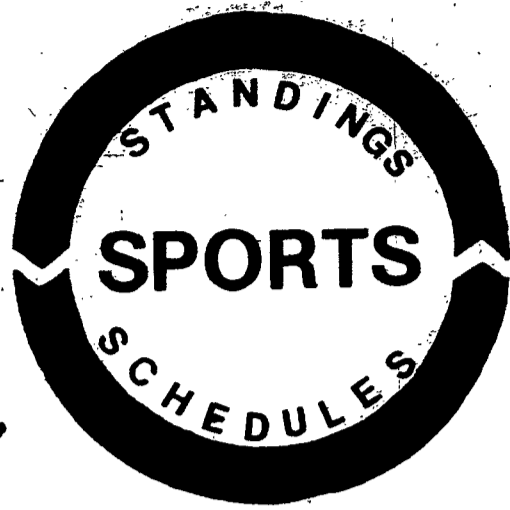

Current Events Studied In Light of Justice

Though Nazareth Academy Theology teacher Bernard McCullen's new course, Social Justice, is not directly related to the Peace and Justice in Education Program, he doesn't mind it being associated with the premise. He explained the course as "trying to understand the gospels of peace and justice the way Jesus taught," and emphasized it deals with the same types of questions as Peace and Justice.

The course is an elective, extracurricular credit subject, open to seniors. Those participating meet after school on alternate Mondays and are enthusiastic about the course's mind stretching exercises in reasoning. The program demands an awareness of current events; an understanding of the kinds of attitudes that precipitate these events, and the examining of the different stands people take on issues and why they take them. For the students involved, it

means becoming knowledgeable about a wide spectrum of issues — communism, Middle East Crisis, Human Rights, Panama Canal Treaty — so they as individuals can formulate opinions based on reason rather than emotion. This learning to reason has led the class to study a particular social attitude; anti-intellectualism in America. According to McCullen, there is a

suspicion of the life of the mind and of those considered to represent it. He and his students are investigating when and how this mood evolved in this country and their studies take them back to the Puritan age, progress through the McCarthy era and into the present day.

Though the course is in its infancy, one thing has been impressed upon the students. "It's important for people to get involved even

if it's just to read the papers," exclaimed Rose Giarratano. And McCullen's class does read the papers especially the New York Times where they select their topics to be discussed in the light of social justice awareness.

"If we are going to preach," declared McCullen, "we should live what we preach," and went on to point out that peace and justice doesn't seem to be a guiding force in our society.

Educational Variety

Elmira — Juniors and seniors at Notre Dame High School got an opportunity for a learning experience outside their usual class schedule Oct. 13.

While freshmen and sophomores were taking tests, the upperclassmen spent the day studying a single topic, which they selected from 27 offerings. The seminars were taught by faculty as well as some persons from the community.

Subjects covered included car care, baking bread, making placemats, a one-day crash-course in typing, journalism, "how to talk to your television set," and a needlepoint class taught by Father Richard Murphy, Notre Dame's chaplain.

Several of the offerings included trips off campus, including two groups who visited Cornell University, one looking at architecture, the other touring the veterinary school. Another group learned about the Mark Twain connections with Elmira, and visited places pertinent to Twain's residence in Elmira. Another group toured the Tioga Point Museum in Athens, Pennsylvania.
