The Faces of Primitive Man

Sister Eileen Casey, Humanities teacher at Bishop Kearney High School defined the course as "a study of the creative expressions of man in art, music, literature and philosophy through the ages. As each work reflects both the personality of the creator and the external forces at work on him, the course will attempt to study the major ideas and values of each era as well as the compulsion of the artist in the expression of the ideal."

Since the first day in class, the students have studied all aspects of primitive man's existence. They define primitive as people who did not have technology. The first assignment was to make masks similar to those the primitives used in their socio-religious ceremonies.

Each member of the class gained valuable experience and learned to appreciate the art of the primitive man more fully.

The materials used for

each mask ranged from clay and paper mache to abalone and feathers for the finishing touches. One student fused the mirrors from a small compact for eyes, symbolizing a

reflection of one's self in the mask.

The class has since moved on to the study of ancient Egyptian and Greek mythology. They have future plans to visit the art gallery and the museum.
