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## **Bp. McCafferty: Must Act Now**

Both as Bishop Hogan's representative to the health care facilities of the diocese and personally, may I ask you to make every effort on the weekend of Dec. 3-4, to secure signatures from your parishioners who are concerned for the maintenance of obstetrical services at St. Mary's Hospital.


After the recent action of the State Department of Health ordering the close of the hospital's obstetrical unit by Jan. 1, the only avenue of recourse is through the procurement of a waiver based on a present demonstrated religious need for the services provided by this unit. Obviously, we must act now, and there is certainly such a need.

I am sure you realize St. Mary's is the only full service Catholic Hospital between Syracuse and Buffalo. It is unthinkable that obstetrical services cannot be obtained in a Catholic Hospital in the third largest city in New York State.

Through its obstetrical services; St. Mary's alone offers freedom of choice and freedom from fear for thousands of people, Catholic and non-Catholic, who conscientiously oppose abortion, sterilization as a contraceptive procedure, and many "popular" forms of implementing family planning. St. Mary's requires its staff to counsel only natural methods of family planning.

I know this is a busy time in every parish. It is also a time when the Church celebrates the Advent of the Savior Who has come that we may have life and have it more abundantly. Please do everything possible to accurately inform your people of the situation facing St. Mary's Hospital and arrange for an expression of support by everyone who wishes to support the uniquely Catholic teachings for life which are jealously guarded by St. Mary's. Materials for petitioning the waiver must be in Albany by mid-December.


