

Bishop Lamont Describes Injustices in Rhodesia

New Orleans—Diocesan directors of the Holy Childhood Association heard firsthand at their recent national meeting how hard it is for missionaries to keep out of trouble these days.

Irish Bishop Donal Lamont, who was expelled from Rhodesia last March, said his dispensing of some simple medicines was the beginning of his difficulties. This normal mission function led to a charge, he said, of "aiding and failing to report 'terrorists' opposed to the Rhodesian regime of Ian Smith." Bishop Lamont was convicted Oct. 1, 1976, and sentenced to 10 years at hard labor, but expulsion was his lot instead.

the conference that "the important image of the Church suited for our times is that of servant—the Church as a servant of and for the world."

In his address, Father Francis Wright, national director of the association, spoke of the "world-wide responsibility" of every diocesan mission office, "a responsibility of which it was seriously reminded by the Second Vatican

Council," he said, and which is "equal to that of the pastoral care of its own diocesan members." The Holy Childhood is the only mission organization dedicated exclusively to young people, the director added.

The Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood was founded in 1843 in France. The U.S. director's office is in Pittsburgh.

Inhambane, says the sign on the window at the Missions Office at 123 East Ave. In Mozambique, and in Rochester, it means "welcome to our house." The message apparently is working as Father Joseph Reinhart, diocesan missions director, reports that attendance at the daily Mass (12:05 p.m.) at the missions chapel has been increasing. The window of the storefront office and chapel has also been decorated with photos depicting missions activities around the world.

He told of the torture of one of his black priests, whose comment during the three days of horror was, "I am doing my retreat."

The Irish prelate was the principal speaker at the directors' fourth national conference. He pointed out that the Synod of Bishops in Rome had called for "action on behalf of justice, for participation in the transformation of the world, as a constitutive dimension of the Gospel."

"What is wrong with the Rhodesian regime," he said, "is that it denies justice to the black citizenry, that is, to the majority of the citizens of the country."

Speakers generally stressed the importance of instilling in the young a Christian sense of mission.
