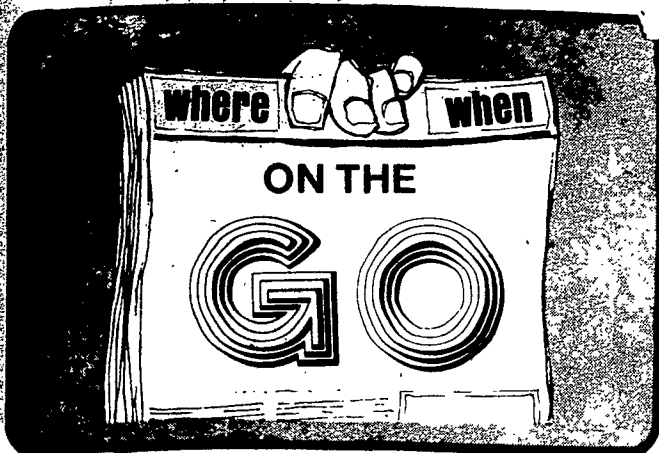

## Nazareth Spotlights Physical Education

Ms. Karen Roycraft, Nazareth Academy's physical education director, has built a program around definite goals and values. She notes the growing emphasis on physical fitness among Americans and agrees that this is a real need today. Karen, however, sees her physical education program in a broader context with the stress on learning through physical activities. Values she strives to develop include accepting both one's abilities and limitations, willingness to try new things, persistence in the face of initial failure and enjoying physical activities both as an individual and as a member of a group.

Nazareth's freshmen learn basic physical skills while sophomores and juniors build on these through competitions and

choices of activities such as volleyball, basketball, kickball, tumbling, floor hockey, speedball and square dancing.

Seniors enjoy an elective program, choosing a new activity every five weeks: fencing, floor bowling, ping pong, badminton. They grade themselves, in consultation with Ms. Roycraft, and through this experience learn how to evaluate their performances and efforts accurately. Underclassmen keep a checklist marking their skill and effort ratings which they finalize with their teacher.

Ms. Roycraft believes physical activities are a means to an end through which girls learn more about themselves and come to appreciate their own abilities and those of others.
