Vatican City (RNS) — Pope Paul has urged the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) to remember the "ethical" aspect of the problems it deals with and to regard its activities as "a service" to the world's neediest.

The food problem, he said, "is one which urgently demands large-scale undertakings... by the international community. The Church has unceasingly shared this pressing anxiety."
