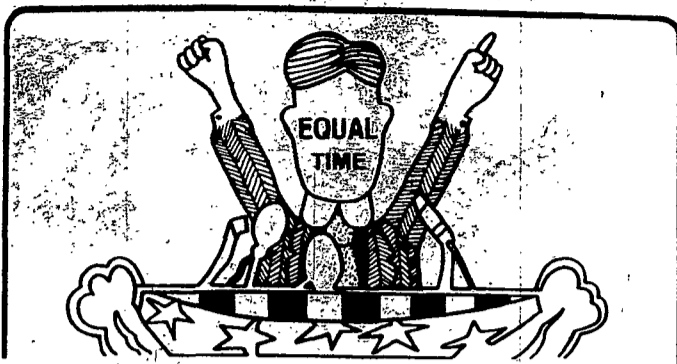

## Ramich Receives Ernie Davis Award

Elmira — Steve Ramich, Notre Dame senior, was named recipient of the 15th annual Ernie Davis Memorial Award Dec. 11, at the 17th annual B'nai B'rith Smoker, with 250 persons present.

The award, in honor of the late Ernie Davis, Elmira Free Academy athlete, All-America football player at Syracuse University, and Heisman Trophy winner, is presented annually to the Elmira area's outstanding football player.

Ramich, the sixth winner from Notre Dame, was preceded by his brother, Joel, who won the award as

a Notre Dame athlete in 1966.

Ramich's outstanding senior season, in which the Crusaders tied for the Bi-State league championship, saw him run or pass for 16 touchdowns, including four rushing and two passing in a 42-0 win over Waverly.

Other Notre Dame winners of the award have been Matt Riordan, 1976 (shared), A. J. Nassar, 1973, Jack Leonard, 1965, and Mike Malone, 1964. Joel Ramich's selection in 1966 was the third consecutive for the Crusaders, whose six winners is high among the five schools involved.
