

It wasn't until 'she arrived home that the aftershock hit her — it was then she realized how many people had been listening to her -

expecially since her mother. had told the whole neighborhood.

Ann emphasized that the one big advantage to this type of career is it gives you confidence in yourself, there's no time to be shy."or to sit back and say I can't do it, you have to.'

Besides her broadcasting duties which involves weekly meetings with the station people. Ann belongs to the Spanish club, ski club, plays tennis, is learning the guitar, and is a cashier at Star Markets. She has her eye on either the University of Buffalo or Niagara University where whe will pursue her communication studies.
